A couple years ago at the Pastors/Musicians Dinner, I had the good fortune to sit at a table with the pastor and musician from Trinity Lutheran Church in Lemoyne, and found out that they were husband and wife! They were new to the East Coast, having lived in North Dakota, and spending 18 years in Illinois and 6 years in Ohio.



Carolyn's degrees are in Sociology and Political Science from Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, where she took private piano lessons and sang in the choir. She worked for four years for the former American Lutheran Church doing Educational Research as assistant to the director. When her children, Joshua Daniel, 28, and Katie, 25, were in grade school, Carolyn started work on a music degree, which she finished at Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville, Illinois. While working on that accomplishment, she studied organ with Dr. Nancy Ypma at McKendree College. Carolyn has worked in congregations without her husband Evan, but the last two churches have hired them as a team. She considers it an honor to be able to do this since they work so well together.

Since she has come to Trinity, Lemoyne, the choir has grown from 12 to 28 members, two handbell choirs have been added in the past year, and a youth chime choir has been formed. She also spoke of having 8 brass players, plus strings, saxophone, flute and percussion players available for special events and accompaniments. Carolyn considers it a blessing to be in churches where she is able to help their programs grow. She likes to work with people and help them achieve.

The Houcks are avid Civil War buffs and love history. They spend a lot of time reading about and visiting the battle fields. Carolyn also enjoys cross-stitch needlework and has a music studio in which she teaches piano.

Their son, a graduate of Johns Hopkins, lives in Bel Air, Maryland, and works in the Inner Harbor, Baltimore with Raven Technologies, setting up computer systems for companies. Daughter Katie is employed by her alma mater, St. Louis University in St. Louis, Missouri, on the staff of Residence Life, and is working on her Master's degree.

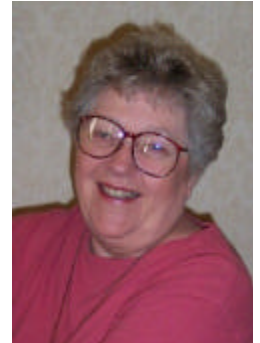
## Getting to Know You

Recently I had the chance to interview one such person. Usually very loquacious, this lady was momentarily at a loss for words when approached for this article. But as everyone knows, Carolyn Evens is rarely without substantial comments about nearly every subject pertaining to organs, churches and music. So here is a chance to 'get to know' Carolyn.



Q: Where are you from originally?

A: I'm from the West Oakland section of Philadelphia.

Q: Where do you live now?

A: I live in the Borough of Camp Hill.

Q: What is your present church assignment?

A: After thirty-nine years of employment, I decided to retire and just do sub work, which I really enjoy.

Q: Tell us about your formal education/training in music or in other areas of your life.

A: As a child growing up in the Depression Era, I found that my parents could not afford college for me. I was fortunate, however, to have the opportunity to study organ with Dr. William T. Timmings, FAGO, and choral conducting with Dr. Harold Gilbert, AAGO. In my 50's, I decided I'd like to give an informal try at going to college. I took a number of courses at HACC which I thoroughly enjoyed.

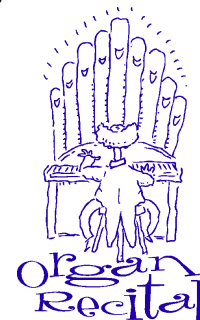

## Recital of Music for Organ and Trumpet

Music for trumpet and organ will be the focus of a recital to be presented on Saturday, September 21 at 7:30 pm in the sanctuary of Market Square Church. Organist Pierce Getz will be joined by trumpeter par excellence Barbara Prugh of the Philadelphia area. Described as a "rare artist; one who is a consummate musician and a brilliant virtuoso," she is very well known for her performances in chamber ensembles, symphony orchestras, and as a soloist.

In addition to performing widely as featured soloist in the United States, Ms. Prugh has played and recorded in several European countries. In addition, she has performed on occasion as part of the Philadelphia Orchestra's trumpet section, including the recording of an all-Respighi CD with conductor Ricardo Muti, and she is Mannheim Steamroller's favorite trumpeter when they come to the Philadelphia area.

Pierce Getz, organist and director of music at Market Square Church, will be heard in solo performances of music by Bach, Dupre and Bossi. He will join Ms. Prugh in performing a wide variety of literature, including works by Martini, Albinoni, Hovhanness and Langlais.

There is no admission charge for the recital. A freewill offering will be received. Free parking will be available in the Market Square Garage.

### Update on Market Square's Pipe Organ

During a recent electrical storm, it has been determined that the steeple of Market Square Presbyterian Church was struck by lightning. The current traveled into the organ, knocking it out for a short while. According to Pierce Getz, Market Square's minister of music, nothing is definite at this time about problems that might have occurred, but a cursory examination by technicians is that damage is not extensive. The combination action is still operative. The organ was not used during the Sunday worship service following the mishap, but was back in operation the next week.

### Shenk Scholarship Fund

Last September your Board of Directors set up a Scholarship fund for the purpose of promoting and encouraging the study of organ to interested students throughout the Central PA region. The fund was started from a monetary gift of the Violette I. Shenk memorial. This summer there were two student recipients of the scholarship. They received paid organ lessons from our past Dean Shelly Moorman-Stahlman. The students were Kate Luley and Caleb Flick. Congratulations to both of them.



Kate Luley was one of our POE students from last year. She is a graduate of Mechanicsburg Area High School and was featured in a Patriot News article in May, 2002. For her senior project, Kate learned to play the pipe organ. Kate will attend Penn State University Schreyer Honors College majoring in Biology.

Caleb Flick will be a senior in the Meyerstown High School this coming year. He received 2<sup>nd</sup> prize in the Lebanon Women's Club Music Piano Competition this past spring. Caleb enjoys classical music and wishes to also study hymns and music employed in the church service.

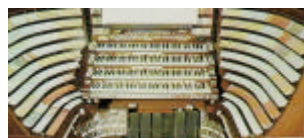

A POE is a remarkable way for students to become better acquainted with the pipe organ, providing them with the opportunity to hear and play a wide variety of instruments, to learn how they work, to explore repertoire both familiar and unfamiliar, and to meet other young musicians with similar interests.

Tuition for the week is \$325, including accommodation, all meals, local transportation, and entry to concerts and special events.

Q: List previous assignments/churches and anything special about your career as an organist that you wish to share.

A: Like most of us, I started playing the organ at an early age - 17 for my first church. Since moving to the Harrisburg area I have served in two churches: Mount Calvary Episcopal Church in Camp Hill for fifteen years, and at Trinity Lutheran in Lemoyne for fourteen years.

Q: What are some milestone memories of your music career or in your life in general?

A: Well, in the music area, working for Dr. Gilbert as his organist at Trinity Episcopal in Moorestown, New Jersey. In my personal life, having my two sons and a husband who has encouraged my musical aspirations throughout our life together has been most fulfilling.

Q: What other types of music/instruments are you interested in?

A: I enjoy singing, and through the kindness of Michael Shoemaker at St. Stephen's Episcopal Cathedral in Harrisburg, I do get to sing with his choir for their Christmas Concert and also during their Lenten season. I do like jazz, but I can't play it. Somehow it comes out sounding like I'm playing Bach. So I just listen to it.

Q: Why did you choose to become a church organist? Is this your full-time career? If not, what do you do as your full-time career?

A: I think, in retrospect, that I admired my piano/organ teacher so much that I wanted to be like him. Also!!!! My mother thought that playing the organ would be a very "lady-like" occupation.

Q: What are your hobbies/interests? Do you have any special collections?

A: I like to sew, read, cook and entertain. And oh yes, go to AGO National Conventions.

Q: Tell us about your family - your children, grandchildren, pets, etc.

A: I have two sons, Cork and Chuck. They each have a boy and a girl who range in age from 16 years down to 4 years of age. I also have a couple of great daughters-in-law!

Q: Would you have any 'words of wisdom' for those who are just coming into or are new to the church music field?

A: It is a wonderful field. But don't get into this field if you expect to earn big money - you won't!! But for me, I not only derive a great deal of satisfaction from doing a job that I love, but it also provides me a way to be able to serve the Lord.
