

Getting to Know . . .

. . . *Nicholas Basehore*

Usually, I save the response to the last question on the interview form as a way to bring an article to a close, but this time I would like to *start* with Nick's answer to that question, since it seems to closely reflect his own 5-year journey into the ecclesiastical music world. In response to the question, "What words of wisdom would you have for those who are just coming into or are new to the church music field?" Nick wrote, "Be flexible but don't compromise your beliefs, and have a sense of humor. You never know what new "adventure" this vocation will bring next!" Let's start Nick's story from the beginning:

Originally from Lebanon, PA, he began his musical career studying piano with Mary Beazley when he was in first grade. He later began both piano and organ studies with Bonita Luciotti and studied with her up until his graduation from Cedar Crest High School. He currently holds the Bachelor of Music degree from Clarion University of Pennsylvania, where he majored in Music Business, with organ as his primary/declared instrument. There he studied organ with Donald Black and Pamela Stover, and piano with Paula Amrod. Upon graduation from Clarion, he did a national search (on the AGO website!) and was hired as the Associate Director of Liturgy and Music at St. Petronille Catholic Church in Glen Ellyn, IL. This is the only church dedicated to St. Petronille in the western hemisphere. She is buried within St. Peter's Basilica in Rome and depicted in some of the Roman Catacombs. While in Glen Ellyn, he also "moonlighted" as a keyholder/assistant to Dean Christian, of Ericksen, Christian, and Associates, a local organ building firm. Nick is currently the Director of Liturgical Music at Saint Patrick Cathedral in Harrisburg, where he has oversight of all things musical: the choirs, hymn and liturgical music selection for all Sundays and Feast Days, wedding/funeral preparation, and the "Music under the Dome" concert series. He also works closely with the Office of Worship of the Diocese of Harrisburg for the diocesan events (liturgies celebrated by His Excellency the Most Reverend Kevin C. Rhoades, Bishop of Harrisburg), and he conducts the diocesan Schola Cantorum, an auditioned ensemble of singers from the various parishes of the diocese.

Nick's greatest milestone in his college years occurred when he was the Musical Director/Pit Conductor for one of the theatrical productions in his senior year. For this he was awarded a certificate of meritorious achievement from the Kennedy Center's American College Theatre Festival. At St. Patrick's, his greatest milestones have been (1) playing the main organ in the Great Upper Church at the National Shrine of the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC, for a diocesan pilgrimage in October, 2006; (2) playing and conducting for the 100th Anniversary Celebration of the Dedication of Saint Patrick Cathedral, which was attended by both William Cardinal Keeler, retired Archbishop of Baltimore (and fellow Lebanon native) and Justin Cardinal Rigali, Archbishop of Philadelphia; and (3) playing for the live broadcast on the EWTN network for this past Ascension Thursday, which broadcast, he was told, was viewed in 84 million homes.

Interestingly enough, Nick says he really didn't choose to be an organist, it sort of chose him. He really didn't have an idea of what else he could do to make a full-time living, so he took the plunge into the church music world and has surprised even himself! For being a professional organist, he says, he really doesn't listen to much organ music other than when he is learning a specific piece. He tends to spend more time listening to jazz (both classic and the more modern "smooth jazz"), 70's/80's rock, and today's modern pop/rock/metal "world music", some Gregorian chant, etc., etc. He also enjoys the occasional opera, and when he lived in Chicago, had season tickets to the Lyric Opera. When not in the sphere of music, Nick enjoys cooking (he is the family chef!) and fine wines. He is also a fan of Phillies and Red Sox baseball and Steeler's football. A college friend, who was Byzantine Catholic, taught Nick how to make *pysanky*, Ukrainian Easter eggs, and making these eggs for family and friends is his annual Lenten project.

You may not have chosen a career as an organist, Nick, but we are all glad it chose you! You certainly seem to be flexible, and you've already had many adventures in such a short time. We in the Harrisburg Branch of the AGO wish you many, many more!

Have You Seen These?

The book I will review for you this month is **Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers** by David Lasky and published by Augsburg Fortress and listing the selections as Easy Medium - Medium. The pieces are for the Advent/Christmas/Epiphany seasons.

The first piece is an *Entrata* on **Rejoice, Rejoice, Believers** (HAF TRONES LAMPA FARDIG) and is registered for one-manual and pedal. (*If you don't have at least one manual you're in trouble at this point!*) It is a full organ sound that is two pages in length with half, quarter, and eighth notes and on three different measures 4 sixteenth notes in the left hand. It would be fine for a postlude or possibly a Gospel processional.

Our second offering is three intonations on the hymn **A Stable Lamp is Lighted** (TOLLEFSON). The first one is registered for flutes 8' & 2' on one manual with NO pedals, the second is registered for a solo reed on manual I, flutes 8' & 4' on manual II, and pedal 16' & 8' Bourdons to balance + II/Pedal, the third is registered for one manual and pedals with a full sound. Incidentally, all three are one page in length.

Our third selection is **As With Gladness Men of Old** (DIX) as a prelude. It is a delightful three-page gem registered for flutes 8' & 2' on a manual and 4' principal or light reed in the pedal. This little dance-like piece was fun to play and I look forward to using it next season.

A meditation on **Away In a Manger** (AWAY IN A MANGER) is registered for three manuals, but you can do it on two. The strings and flutes are used on one manual and the solo is between a 4' flute and an 8' oboe. A few simple key changes keep the interest in this our pages selection.

Fling Wide the Door (MACHT HOCH DIE TOR), a trumpet tune of two pages is very straight forward with no surprises.

Three reflections, each of one page duration, on **Your Little Ones, Dear Lord** (HER KOMMER DINE ARME SMA) are very light in learning. All of these could be used as an offertory voluntary or done together as a prelude.

Our final piece is a trio on **Comfort, Comfort Now My People** (FREU DICH SEHR), done in a baroque style that would be a pleasing prelude.

CODE OF ETHICS - Revised by the National Council on April 16, 2007

Preamble: The purpose of the American Guild of Organists is to promote the organ in its historic and evolving roles, to encourage excellence in the performance of organ and choral music, and to provide a forum for mutual support, inspiration, education, and certification of Guild members. Voting members are entitled to enjoy the privileges and are expected to accept the responsibilities of membership in the Guild. Members shall be considered equally for Guild offices and participation in Guild activities. These are the rules that shall be considered binding upon all voting members in good standing.

RULE 1. Members shall promote good working relationships within the American Guild of Organists and shall respect the employment of colleagues. Members shall address differences between themselves and other members by following the procedures outlined in the *Discipline*.

RULE 2. Members shall not seek or appear to be seeking employment for themselves, a student, or a colleague, in a position held by someone else. Members shall apply for employment only for a position which the employer, with the knowledge of the incumbent musician, has officially and publicly declared vacant by announcement of the vacancy.

RULE 3. In cases pending under the *Procedures* or in cases where the National Council has determined that a position has been made vacant by wrongful termination of a member of the American Guild of Organists, members shall not seek or accept regular or permanent employment for themselves, a student, or colleague at that Institution until the National Council is satisfied that differences between the Guild and the Institution have been resolved. Interim services may be provided for a period of 90 days.

RULE 4. Before accepting an engagement for a wedding, funeral, or other service, members shall obtain the approval of the incumbent musician. In cases where this engagement has been requested by a third party, it is appropriate for the third party to offer the incumbent his/her customary fee. It is the responsibility of members to inform the third party of this rule.

RULE 5. Members shall conduct professional activities with truthfulness, honesty and integrity, and shall maintain sensitivity in matters of a personal or confidential nature.

RULE 6. Members shall not discriminate against others on the basis of race, national origin, age, religious affiliation, gender, marital status, sexual orientation, disability, or medical condition (including, but not limited to, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).

I agree to abide by the Code of Ethics.
