Hymn Festival Scheduled for March 22

On Sunday afternoon, March 22, at 4:00 p.m., a Hymn Festival under the direction of internationally-known composer and conductor Michael Burkhardt, will feature a 125-voice choir of adults, youth and children, at Trinity Lutheran Church, 2000 Chestnut Street, Camp Hill. The event is co-sponsored by Trinity Lutheran and the Harrisburg Chapter of the American Guild of Organists (AGO). The Festival, entitled 'With People of Every Time and Place - A Festival of Hymns,' will also include a brass ensemble led by Dr. William Stowman of Messiah College, handbells, timpani and percussion. Trinity's singing choirs and bell choirs, in addition to singers from various area churches, will constitute the Festival Choir, with Timothy Koch, host musician, as coordinator.



The public is cordially invited to attend and participate in the Hymn Festival, with a Reception following. Admission is free, but donations will be accepted. Call 737-8635 or www.trinitycamphill.org for information.

Dr. Burkhardt is in frequent demand for his creative work with children's choirs, as a choral clinician, organ recitalist and hymn festival leader. For the past six years, Burkhardt has served on the faculty of Carthage College in Wisconsin, as director of choral activities, college organist, and artist-in-residence. Prior to his appointment at Carthage, he was a faculty associate in organ at Arizona State University. In addition, he has served Christ College, Irvine, CA, as college organist and head of studies in church music and music education, as well as Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN, and Trinity Seminary, Columbus, OH, as guest lecturer in their Master of Sacred Music programs.

Getting to Know . . . Bob Bell

Who could imagine that the merger of three churches could result in a lifelong interest in pipe organs, the seed of a friendship that grew into a lifelong marriage? But it did just that for Bob Bell, organist at his home church, Paxton UM.

Born and raised in the uptown Harrisburg area, Bob grew up singing in various church choirs. His father was a professionally trained tenor, and Bob aspired to grow up and be like his Dad. He played violin and trombone in school, and his first piano studies began at age 6. Piano lessons were \$2.00 per half hour, and unfortunately, disagreeable to the young musician. He hated having to practice instead of playing outside with his friends, and even worse, memorizing pieces for the dreaded recitals. His parents moved into the Colonial Park area when he was about 12 and Bob acquired a new piano teacher who played duets with him and did not smack his hands with a pencil, trying to get him to "feel" the music. He continued piano study until he was 18, and it was in stopping lessons that he began to play for fun!

Somewhere in his early to mid-teens, Bob decided that he wanted to become a church organist at some time during his life. He actually began studying organ when he was 16 with Mrs. Rachel Irvin, his church organist, who taught him the fundamentals of basic hymn playing, heel-toe pedal technique, legato touch and many other things on an old Allen 602D. After his first nerve-wracking public organ performance in his church, there were no more performances for 20 years.

In 1977, Bob graduated from Dauphin County Vo-Tech with both his high school diploma and a vocational certificate in Electronic Technology. From there he went on to Penn State and graduated with a BS in Electrical Design Engineering, specializing in digital electronics and computer design. For the next 14 years he held various engineering positions in several local companies. After that came a completely new career in computer systems administration. In 1999 he became the Director of Technology for the Harrisburg Academy, the position he holds today, and considers this the most rewarding of all his jobs (next to playing the organ for church).

About ten years ago, he began substitute organ playing in the Harrisburg area. He played regularly at his home church in 2005 as a temporary substitute while the church searched for an organist. The following year he was asked to stay on and became the regular organist, never having applied, interviewed, or auditioned for the job! Bob realized another goal around the same time - that of having a home practice instrument. Through a friend of Jerry Hoover's, he acquired an old Gulbransen Classic Model D. Although it was a fix-er-up, with his electronic experience, Bob was able to make the instrument playable.

After that, he joined the AGO, signed up as a substitute as previously mentioned, and in a relatively short time, had a job as a regular organist. While at Paxton UM, he has been instrumental in helping his church acquire handbells and start a handbell choir. Realizing that the church's old Allen 602D was on it's last legs, Bob helped move his congregation to purchasing an Allen Q345. This past January the organ was dedicated and Michael Stairs, organist for the Philadelphia Orchestra in Verizon Hall played the dedicatory recital.



As far as interest in other musical instruments, he long ago gave up the trombone and violin. Now he sings tenor (like his dad), substitutes in the handbell choir and enjoys all forms of ensemble music. He putters with a computer he built in the mid-70's, a technical challenge he meets successfully. He has his own website, www.bellcompserv.com, enjoys fishing and is still active in scouting.

He and his wife, Barb, have two children, Rob and Elyse. Rob is currently a 5th year senior at Penn State Main Campus

studying Landscape Architecture. Elyse is a junior in the Business Information Management program at Penn State Harrisburg. The family is rounded out with two cats, a 17 year old lilac point Siamese and a 10 year old orange tabby "mutt".

As he looks back over his life, Bob is convinced that everything unfolded just as God had planned, and that he wouldn't change a thing!

And now for his words of wisdom: "For me, it's all about practice. With my very limited God-given talent, I have to work at everything I do on the organ. Nothing comes easy, and without the instrument at my home, I could not do it. I recognize that it was only by the grace of God that I came to find my home practice instrument, so I realize that this is God's calling for me and it's up to me to work hard and make a go of it.

It's equally necessary to have a reason to be motivated to practice. Nothing is any more motivating than knowing you have to play three pieces of service music, three or four hymns, perhaps a psalm or choral response, and a choir anthem this Sunday, and you have just four days to pull it together. You have to be able to play with confidence and that only comes with practice.

Not everyone in church music is going to be the organist. We are all very much in need of dedicated choir members, handbell players, instrumentalists and even people that can help behind the scenes with maintenance of music libraries, choir robes, or even sitting on the organ committee. It is the combined efforts of everyone that helps fulfill Christ's Great Commission.

Finally, one last, somewhat selfish word of wisdom. If you can work it out, don't go it alone. I have heard of organists burning out after a few years because they find it so difficult to take a break. I have been playing regularly now for just over three years, but already I am deeply indebted to my good friend Craig Deimler, who sits in as my assistant organist once every month. This gives me that refreshing break I need and think every organist needs every so often. I might just sit in the pew, I might sit in with the tenors on the anthem, I might visit another church, or I might even go camping with the Scouts or pay a rare visit to the river. However it's done, the time off is needed."
