

The Church Organist shall play for the Sunday Services of Worship; currently this is a single service at 9:00 am; Special Congregational Services; and Choir rehearsals; may play at weddings and funerals; shall select the Prelude, Offertory and Postlude music; shall submit to the church office titles of music to be used for the weekly service; shall attend monthly music staff meetings and other music meetings as needed.

Starting Salary is negotiable based on skill and expertise. Range from minimum of \$6,000 payable 15th and 30th of each month. \$500 organist accountable reimbursement (payable upon submitted expenses, to cover Professional Organization Dues, Additional Training, Music, and other expenses). Starting 2 weeks paid vacation as determined by the Staff Parish Relations Committee, additional weeks may be negotiated.

The instrument is a three-manual Allen MDS-70 installed in 1997. The Sanctuary Choir is of 20+ members and there is a Bell Choir of 10+ members. Other ensembles include a Contemporary Worship Team. The Church Organist is not required to accompany this group, unless there is a personal desire to do so. This group plays a few times a year. There is also a Children's Choir.

The congregation has 410 members with an average weekly attendance of 180.

Getting to Know Alan Hair

Born and raised a real Pennsylvanian, Alan grew up in the tiny town of Mercersburg in Franklin County. It's an historic town of one traffic light and a place where everyone knows one another. Its biggest claim to fame is that it is the birthplace of our 15th president, James Buchanan. It is also the home of the Mercersburg Academy, an independent college preparatory school (9-12). On the campus is a lovely Gothic chapel with a 49-bell carillon tower on which weekly concerts resound throughout the town. He now resides in an old house (1872) in Hummelstown, another small town with a sense of history.

His present church assignment is as organist at The Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity . . . otherwise known as Holy Trinity Lutheran. Unbelievable to him, he has been there since 1984 after searching for a position after graduating from college.

Alan began piano study in first grade with a member of his church who gave lessons. He enjoyed it from the start and needed little persuasion to practice. As he waited for the family to get ready to go somewhere, he would sit down at the piano and practice. He always had an interest in the organ and began lessons in about 8th grade with the organist at church. By 11th grade he was substituting in a local church on a regular basis. He also played clarinet in Concert Band and Clarinet Choir, tenor sax in the Marching Band, keyboard in the Jazz Band, sang in school choruses, Show Choir, church choir and the Mercersburg Community Chorus. He attended Elizabethtown College and "waffled" between Business and Music majors. A degree in business administration won out in the end, but he spent more time and energy in the music building! He has accompanied choirs and soloists since Middle School and really enjoyed those experiences. What better way to help with college expenses than to be paid as an accompanist for the Concert Choir!

Previous assignments and experiences before Trinity Lutheran came with his early days as a substitute. His entire career has been at Holy Trinity and it is a rare occasion when he is not on the organ bench on a Sunday morning!

Milestone memories tackling the accompaniments to *Battle Hymn of the Republic* and the *Hallelujah Chorus* in high school; singing with the Mercersburg Area Community Chorus as a high school kid, performing some of the major choral works with full orchestra in the Mercersburg Academy chapel; playing *Pictures at an Exhibition* in high school Concert Band and producing an art project in conjunction with the piece (he made a Lego model of The Louvre – with a brief thought of a career in architecture); college choir tours playing different organs each night; touring with the Susquehanna Chorale in Scotland and

England, singing in wonderful cathedrals; a sanctuary and new organ project at Holy Trinity in 1995; playing for a Morning Prayer service at the Lower Susquehanna Synod Convention this past summer.

Alan is also very interested in choral music. He has been singing tenor with the Susquehanna Chorale since 1984 and credits founder and artistic director Linda Tedford with being a big influence in his musical career. Monday night rehearsal is like receiving a private voice lesson, and he feels that he has definitely become a more sensitive musician under her leadership. He accompanies the Susquehanna Children's Chorale and finds joy in watching the skills of the children develop. His wish for each of them is that they become inspired to engage in a lifelong pursuit of musical pleasure.

Although he did not choose music as a full-time career, it has been a great "secondary" career. He has always had the desire to play the organ – he couldn't wait for his legs to get long enough to reach the pedals. He often experiences a spine-tingling, other-worldly feeling when playing the organ. Inspiring robust singing of the worship assembly and interpreting hymn texts through imaginative introductions, registrations and harmonizations is a creative process which he truly enjoys. His "worldly" job, after spending about ten years in retail management, is working in Human Resources for the Commonwealth of PA.

Alan has been married to his wife, Julia, since 1986. Their "children" are their two cats, Bailey and Cecilia. His hobbies and interests revolve around his home . . . renovating, decorating and gardening. He likes to travel, attend concerts, visit historic homes/museums, and enjoys eating good food! Lounging on a beach is a near heavenly experience for him as well.

Alan's advice for those who are just coming into or are new to the church music field sounds relatively easy and simple, but those of you who are singers or organists know that it takes time and experience to accomplish all this:

Music is a tremendous gift and is such an integral part of a worship experience. Music has the power to make God "real" for his people. Through music, God can be awesome, powerful, gentle, fearful, beautiful, ugly, etc. and the organ/organist has the ability to interpret all these various characteristics. Be sensitive to what is going on around you; relate what you are playing to hymn texts/ themes of the day; create a mood. If you have some talent and desire, find a way to share your musical gift; our churches need competent and creative music leaders. Study with the best teachers in your area and practice so that you can be the best you can be. Learn to sing; an organist playing hymns/accompanying a soloist needs to know how to sing/how to breathe.

Have You Seen This?

What a wonderful way to start the New Year – with something new **to me**. I recently found these two volumes of hymn settings when I was looking through the organ music at my favorite



music store. The title of each volume is Those Wonderful Welsh, six hymn tune settings by Wilbur Held. They are published by MorningStar Music, MSM-10-841 (Set 1). A majority of these tunes are known and loved by the major denominations. Set 1 starts with RHOSYMEDRE and is registered for Manual 8' & 4' with Pedal Solo Reed 8'. It is three pages in length and the melody is in the pedal throughout. Number two is LLANFYLLIN, unknown to most of us, but a nice two-page arrangement for Solo stop, acc. Swell Flutes 8' & 4' and Pedal 16' Swell to Pedal. The third tune is **ARFON** and is known to Presbyterians, Methodists and UCC Churches. It is also registered for two manuals & pedal. The Great uses Principals and Flutes 8', 4', 2' (Mixture), Swell Reeds and Mixtures, and Pedal Principals and Flutes 16', 8', 4'. This is an unusual four-page treatment of the tune, because I knew it previously with the words for a Holy Week hymn. It finally ends with everything coupled together. It would make a fine Postlude. HYFRYDOL, the fourth tune, is in everybody's hymnal. This is a charming five-page arrangement using three manuals. However, it can be done on two. The rhythms are a bit tricky with syncopation, but what a fun piece to do! The fifth tune is in the Catholic, Episcopal and Lutheran (LCMS) Hymnals and is titled **LLEDROD.** This is a Postlude or Festival Prelude type selection, using a full sound on the organ with a Solo Trumpet. It is a three-page gem to learn. Our sixth and final tune is AR HYD Y NOS.

Everyone should know this tune and use it. It is a lovely three-page piece that uses 8' Solo Flutes and Soft Swell Strings with Soft Pedal to balance.

And now on to Set 2 of **Those Wonderful Welsh**, six hymn tune settings by Wilbur Held, again published by MorningStar Music, MSM-100842. Our first tune is **ABERYSTWYTH** and is in practically all hymnals. The registration uses two manuals and pedal, and is but two pages in length. Anyone can register this using soft Swell stops, a solo stop, and soft Pedal. The second tune is also a well-known one to all, **THE ASH GROVE**. It uses Great 8' Flute and Swell 8' & 2 2/3' with no pedal. Be prepared to move the fingers, because it has running eighth notes from beginning to end. Since no pedal is required, you can concentrate on the running 8' flute throughout. LLAN-FAIR is the next tune that is usually used during the Easter season. It is registered for three manuals, but you can do it on two. It is four pages in length and would make a fine Postlude or Festival Prelude. The fourth tune is ST. **DENIO** (Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise) and is in most hymnals. This is also four pages in length and would be a fine Festival Prelude. CWM RHONDDA is the fifth tune and is known to most of us as "God of Grace and God of Glory" or "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah". This is a rousing hymn tune that is an E-A-S-Y Postlude done on one manual and pedal. The final tune in this set is one that is not listed in our hymnals and is titled HAR-LECH. It requires two manuals & pedal, and is a bit tricky rhythmically. It is three pages in length, and not the easiest one in the book, but a fun piece to master. I have been told that this is a national Welsh piece not unlike a national anthem or rallying piece. Why not take a look at these Two Volumes? You may be pleasantly surprised and rewarded!

Baylor University to Host Midwinter Organ Conference

Baylor University is pleased to host the 12th Annual Midwinter Organ Conference from February 12-14, 2006 at Baylor University in Waco, Texas.

Dame Gillian Weir, one of the world's foremost artists, is making her first appearance at Baylor. Three distinguished alumni of the Baylor School of Music will be heard: Dr. Richard Benefield of Harvard University (in the Southwestern premier of a new work by Daniel Pinkham), Stephen Distad of the historic First Baptist Church of Charleston, South Carolina, and Dr. Kiya Watanabe with his wife, Chiemi, in the closing concert. Dr. Joyce Jones, FAGO, hostess of the Conference, will also be performing.

Baylor University is home to nine pipe organs on campus, including the 92-rank Petty-Madden in Jones Concert Hall, the 62-rank Ruffatti in Roxy Grove Hall, the 58-rank Letourneau in Powell Chapel, the 39-rank Letourneau tracker in Markham Organ Studio, and a 17-rank Ruffatti tracker tuned in Werkmeister III, in Recital Hall III.

Pipes in Proximity

The reformed church in Carlisle began around 1761. The first building was built on South Hanover Street after 1763. The Lutherans formed a few years later and they shared the building from 1765 until 1809 when both congregations decided to build separate buildings. The third building was built in 1828. This building was sold to the Methodists and a fourth building was built on Louther Street



in 1835. Finally the consistory decided to build another building on North Pitt Street for \$7,500 and it was dedicated in 1921.

Several organs preceded the current instrument. On Sunday, May 22, 1983, the Schantz pipe organ was dedicated with a recital by Pierce Getz. This well-conceived two-manual instrument is versatile and a pleasure to play. It is installed in the front of the Nave and speaks directly into the space. The exposed pipework is an attractive addition to the room

The Principal Chorus is warm and pleasing, the flutes are full of character, and the variety of reed voices give many possibilities.

I thank the church's music director Alan Berlin and organist Sharon Maurer for allowing me access to the organ.


