

He briefly describes the talk he plans to give us: "HOW DOES A HYMN MEAN? Hymns are among the most powerful ways of telling the Gospel and shaping Christians. Even apart from the music, there are ways – poetic and theological – in which hymns get under our skin, "tricks" which make it easier to learn them by heart. And it's even more useful for those who choose and lead hymns to explore the depth of meaning in even the most familiar of hymns."

Keep those reservations and sumptuous delicacies coming, and I'll see all of you at Trindle Spring Lutheran Church at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, February 21st. Bring your appetites, too! - **A. From I-83 (Hershey, Middletown, and points east and south**), get on or stay on I-581 (toward Camp Hill) at the York Split. Take the **Rt. 641 Exit**, and do a 360° turn around the cloverleaf. At the T-intersection with Trindle Road, go RIGHT. Stay on Trindle Road as it becomes Main St. in Mechanicsburg, and then becomes East Trindle Road on the other side. At the LAST traffic signal, where Simpson Ferry Road connects to Trindle, you will see a big KEEFER'S grocery store sign on the right. Take the RIGHT FORK (Church Street) past the market instead of Trindle Road, which is straight ahead. Church Street ends at a T-intersection with the old church building. The present building and parking lot are on the right.
- **B. From Carlisle on Trindle Road**, go east toward Mechanicsburg, then after you cross over the Turnpike, there are some streets leading off to the left: Bare Rd., Pheasant St., and then STATE ROAD. Turn LEFT on State Road and the church is about a block from there. (If you turned right, you would be on Sinclair Road.) (If you went past State Rd., you will soon see KEEFER's on your LEFT. You went too far! Please turn around in Keefer's parking lot and come back.)
- **C. From the South on Route 15**, use Rt. 114 exit. Stay on Rt. 114 north, all the way into Mechanicsburg to Main Street. Make a LEFT. Then follow directions as in **A** above to KEEFER's and make the right fork your aim.
- **D.** From the North from I-81, use Rt. 114 exit. At Wal*Mart area, cross over Carlisle Pike and follow 114 into Main St. Mechanicsburg. Make a RIGHT, and proceed as in **A** and **C** above.
- **E.** If I did not cover your planned travel route ... e-mail me quick, (mnelson@energypa.org) or just get yourself into Camp Hill, find Trindle Road near the new Giant Market and KEEP GOING, as in A above.

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Meet Julie Jones

There are many familiar names in this biographical sketch, as the member-of-the-month for February is Julie Jones, who has been influenced and taught by numerous of our Chapter members and friends.

Julie's early life included piano lessons for two years, from ages 10 to 12. In order to pay for the lessons, she cleaned house for her piano teacher's elderly aunt. She doesn't recall any heavy work, so it probably amounted to a lot of dusting. When the aunt died, that was the end of the free lessons.

However, when Julie was growing up, she belonged to the same little United Brethren Church in West Fairview where Jacqueline King, former Harrisburg Symphony and now Hershey Symphony violinist, and her husband Bob, were members. Bob King was the church's Choir Director at that time. One day he heard Julie playing the piano. Julie credits Mr. King with the reason she is an organist today!

He suggested that Julie relieve their regular organist of her Sunday night duties....and so she did...for free, of course. Julie was convinced that since the Lord had given her the talent, she should freely give back her services. She relates that it was a wonderful experience for her since she had no money for lessons and her feet "kind of dangled over those pedals on the floor," but it gave her experience in playing for a congregation.

When Julie was in her early twenties, she began to study with Robert Clippinger. Upon his unfortunate early death, she was accepted by Dr. Ronald Sider, who she credits with being responsible for developing any skills that she may have. When she began her study with Dr. Sider, Julie tells us that she was still so nervous playing for a church service that she was literally dizzy with fear. But Ron was very kind, never criticizing....even when Julie was SURE that he knew she had NOT practiced enough during the week...and gradually she began to develop self-

confidence in her own abilities. Julie says, "Thank you, Ron!"

Dr. Pierce Getz was kind enough to give Julie some private lessons on conducting when she accepted a position at the Derry Street United Methodist Church...."for which I am eternally grateful!" she states. She also studied piano with Dr. Robert Lau, and notes, "He was the first person who talked to me about 'balance' in piano playing. Thanks, Robert."

In the mid-to-late 1980s, Julie studied for a couple years with the late Bob Nelson. Eventually, her job interfered with the lessons and she had to stop. During that time, she spent six weeks substituting for Bob at Trinity Lutheran, Camp Hill. The night before her first Sunday at Trinity, she called Bob in a panic, as that Sunday was the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Bishop Guy Edmiston's Ordination. When she told Bob she was "really scared", he reassured her. "Just look at the cross above the altar, Julie. Don't look at the congregation. Your ears will tell you whether you need to play louder or softer." Three of those weeks in 1987 were spent directing "half a choir" (who called themselves "Julie's Jewels"), as Bob and the other half of the choir were concertizing in Europe. She made it through this assignment with flying colors!

Along Julie's journey in the music world, she received a lot of encouragement and advice from Dave Binkley regarding Children's Choirs, as he had quite a lot of experience with children and youthful singers.

For the next ten years, she was out of the music scene because her work with the U.S. Navy required her to be on the West Coast two weeks out of each month. She didn't imagine that any church would want a "two-weeks-a-month" organist in this day and age! She could not even get substitute jobs because she never knew when she would be out-of-town, and if it would be ONLY two weeks and not more.

When Julie finally retired from the Federal Government in 1998, she states, "I was painfully reminded of the old adage, 'Use it or Lose it!' " So she accepted the position of organist/choir director at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Harrisburg...at the time, a dying church with few responsibilities...in order to focus on re-acquiring her organ-playing capability.

Over the years she has served several congregations, but usually had to leave because of training or travel with the Navy. Julie now serves as organist at St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Highspire where Mr. Steve Strauss is the choir director. She is enjoying this position very much.

The Chapter is thankful for all the teachers and mentors in Julie's life who have helped her become the musician she is today. Thanks for sharing your story with us, Julie, and helping us to know you better!

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Minutes of the AGO Executive Meeting - Tuesday, January 10, 2006

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 PM by Dean Alan Berlin.

One correction to the printed Minutes of the November 15, 2005 meeting: "Katy" in paragraph three, line six, was changed to "Kathy". Tony Ciucci moved acceptance of the amended Minutes with a second by Ken Kline. Minutes were approved.

The Dean also delivered the news that Chapter member Frances Treisbach, director of music at Epiphany Lutheran Church, Colonial Road, Harrisburg, has volunteered to be editor of the 'Bombarde'. A meeting of the Editorial Board is scheduled later this winter, and Alan will be briefing Ms. Treisbach on the process being followed.

The group congratulated Dean Berlin for his article in "The American Organist" about our Chapter's scholar-ship programs for POE Students, summer organ study through the Yocum and Shenk Scholarship Funds, and how the process was set up. He was also complimented on his editorship of the 'Bombarde'.

Treasurer Kathy Gates distributed a three-page report showing the activity in the Checking Account, and outlining the Investment Accounts. She noted that she had sent the additional \$60 to National, as voted in the last meeting. The group voted unanimously to accept the report. She also distributed signed copies of the Auditors' Report. Kathy has volunteered to be an Auditor, following her resignation as Treasurer at the end of the current Chapter year. The Auditors' Report by Brian Rice and Frances Bishop was unanimously accepted, followed a move by Kathy Gates and second of Josephine Freund.

Doris Savage had included with the Agenda package a summary of 'Bombarde' mailing costs. On a question as to whether we should charge the additional cost of mailing during membership dues collection, for those whose material must be mailed, was discussed at length. It was decided not to charge for mailing at this time, since the Directory and the monthly newsletter were part of the dues already being paid. Doris stated that the membership at present is 159.

Tony Ciucci will be convening a meeting of the Nominating Committee, report the results to Dean Berlin, who will set the process in motion in an accelerated manner.

Tim Koch is putting an expiration date on lists of substitutes, from this date forward, as he found that some sources were using old lists, that did not have currently viable names of substitutes to call.

Josephine Freund, in giving the Professional Concerns report, stressed the importance of organists and music directors having signed contracts with their employers, as there are specific problems, seeming to multiply of late, with churches not able to meet their budgets, and as a result, cutting the salary of the musician. She also circulated a proof of the "Guidelines for Compensation of Church and Synagogue Musicians – 2006". Don Golden moved and Ken Kline seconded that we have the Guidelines printed. Alan will arrange to have the printing done. with 500 being the number printed at this time. Also to be printed are 200 cards to be distributed to area funeral directors, outlining the fees for service of an organist at funerals and memorial services. Josephine was thanked for her persistent and diligent work on this project. Note for Program Committee: It was a consensus that next year the Chapter should have someone from National come and speak to us about Professional Concerns, noting the mounting number of colleagues involved in downsizing of budgets.

Mary Jane Nelson gave an update on the February 21st Potluck Dinner for Clergy and Musicians, to be held at Trindle Spring Lutheran Church, at 6:30 p.m. She circulated a chart to be filled in with regard to who planned to come, who was the pastor/guest, and what dish would be brought. After the chart was tallied, there are 16 members and 21 guests signed up to come, to date. We will be providing name tags at the dinner. Mary Jane will be calling those who are waiting to hear what food category is needed. She also handed out a copy of the article to be printed in the February 'Bombarde' with a bio of the speaker, and directions to the church. It was suggested that her phone numbers and e-mail address be added to the article, as had been in previous articles.

Dean Berlin stated that the cost per person for the May Banquet would be \$27.50, including tax and tip.

The committee for the David Cherwien Hymn Festival on April 23 has been working on details for that event.

Ken Kline announced that the Wanamaker Organ Day has been set for Saturday, June 10th, and that Tom Herald will be chartering a bus to go there. The next issue of 'Bombarde' will have details of how to get on board.

The next meeting of the Executive Committee is scheduled for Tuesday, March 28, 2006, at 7:00 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, Camp Hill. The meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

Have You Seen This?

"Organ Music for Lent and Easter" by Raymond H. Haan, published by The Sacred Music Press (KK375), is a book that I use frequently, not only for regular services, but also for Funerals



and Memorial services. It is a collection of eight hymntune voluntaries that most of us have used in one way or another in our work.

The first tune is known to many as *Glory Be To Jesus* - **CASWEL.** This is a three-variation selection and is a wonderful Lenten tune. Variation I uses Swell Light Reed 8' (Trem.), Great Flutes 8'& 4' and Pedal 16' with Gt. to Pd. This is in canon form and is but one page in length. Variation II is a lyrical, two-page, soft voluntary using Swell Soft 8' (4'), Choir or Great Solo 8' stop, and Pedal 16' & 8'. Variation III is a one-page, no pedal voluntary, using a Flute 8' or Flute Celeste 8'.

Our second tune is **SONG 13**, known to us as *Jesu, Grant Me This I Pray*, and has two variations. Variation I is two pages in length and uses Swell Flutes 8'& 4', Choir or Great Soft Reed 8', Pedal 16' & Sw. to Pd. Variation II is one page in length and uses Choir or Great 4' Flute, Swell Celeste 8', and Pedal 16' with Sw. to Pd.

I Know that My Redeemer Lives – **BRADFORD**, is the third Voluntary, and one that I play quite often for funerals. It also has two variations and is a tune by Handel. Variation I uses Swell Soft 8'& 4', Choir or Great Solo 8', and Pedal 16' with Sw. to Pd. Variation II uses the same soft stops, however, you may want to use another Solo stop 8'. It is one page in length. I use these two voluntaries together without any interruption.

How Calm and Beautiful the Morn – CALM, is a delightful two-variation piece for beginning an Easter Dawn Service. Each variation is two pages in length and both are very easy.

The tune **RHOSYMEDRE**, titled *On Wings of Living Light* in the collection, has three variations. Variation I uses a Soft 8' registration with no pedal and is 1 & 2/3 pages in length. Variation II uses Great Flutes 8' & 2 2/3', Swell Flute 8', and Pedal 16' with Sw. to Pd., and is two pages in length. Variation III uses Swell Strings 8' and Pedal 8' Solo or Combination, and is 1½ pages in length. These variations are wonderful for Lent.

BRYN CALFARIA, known here as *Look, Ye Saints! The Sight Is Glorious*, is also two variations over three pages. We all know this Welsh tune and sing it for Easter or Ascension.

The Head That Once Was Crowned With Thorns - ST. MAGNUS, is in three variations on three pages. Variation I uses Swell Soft 8'& 4', Choir or Great Soft 8' Reed, and Pedal 16' & 8'. Prepare to work a bit on the pedal part, which has quite a few skips in it. Variation II is quite short and uses Swell Reed 8', Great 8', 4' & 2', with Pedal of 16', 8' & 4'. Variation III uses no pedal and one manual.

The last hymn tune in the collection is **HORSLEY**, or *There Is a Green Hill Far Away*, another well-known Lenten hymn. This is also a three-variation selection. Variation I uses Swell Celeste 8' & 4', Great or Choir 8', 4' & 2&2/3', or may use a registration of Chimes, and Pedal, Sw. to Pd., with no pedal stops. Variation II uses Swell Soft 8' Reed, Choir or Great Soft 8' & 4', and Pedal 16' & 8', with Ch. to Pd., and is less than a page in length. Variation III uses one manual with a rather full sound and Pedal to match, which ends with double pedal in octaves for the last four measures. This is also one page in length. This collection is a wonderful bargain, considering the number of variations for each Voluntary.

HOT OFF THE PRESS IN TIME FOR EASTER: A new organ piece entitled "ALLELUIAS" by our own Robert Lau. He's done it again; this is a real winner that was commissioned by Camp Hill Presbyterian Church and the Holmes Foundation. It incorporates Christ ist erstanden and Victory, and is a four-page, two-manual selection that you will enjoy playing as a joyous prelude or postlude. Published by Paraclete Press, it is #PPM00615. The most difficult things of which you need to be aware, are the changes in time such as 4/2, 3/2, 9/4. The voluntary begins ff and ends fff. It consists mainly of quarter, half and whole notes with a few eighth note runs. Do yourself a favor and get this for Easter, you will not be disappointed.

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Pipes in Proximity

In the early 1880s the congregation now known as St. Andrew Presbyterian Church was formed by Christ Presbyterian Church



of Lebanon. This "mother church" recognized a need for a church in the eastern section of Lebanon and they formed a new church which later became known as Fourth Street Presbyterian Church. They met in homes for a number of years before building their first building around 1887 which was located on North Fourth Street. In the early 1950s they bought land on the west side of town at their present location on South Twelfth Street. They laid the corner stone of this new building in 1958. Since they no longer were on Fourth Street they voted to adopt the new name of St. Andrew Presbyterian Church. When they moved to this new

building they brought along an electronic organ and in the mid 1960s they decided to replace it with a pipe organ. The Schantz Company was chosen and the new two-manual



organ was installed in 1968. Further expansion was made with an additional wing of classrooms and most recently in 2000 a million-dollar renovation and expansion added a new narthex, chapel, kitchen and offices.

The Schantz organ is a typical two-manual specification with everything one would expect to find. The 8' Principal in the Great is smooth and gentle and the chorus is well balanced. I always enjoy the flutes and the two 8' manual stops work well in dialogue with one another.

I thank resident organist (and my former piano professor) William Fairlamb for his willingness to give me access to the organ and to Malcolm Bliss for providing the church history information.
