

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April 23rd Hymn Festival to Feature Dr. David Cherwein by Mary Jane Nelson



The Harrisburg Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, and Trinity Lutheran Church, Camp Hill, are co-sponsoring a Hymn Festival led by Dr. David Cherwien, at Trinity Lutheran, 2000 Chestnut Street, Camp Hill, on Sunday evening, April 23, at 7:00 p.m. Cherwien, an organist, composer and conductor, will highlight the innovative merging of organ, piano, instruments

and voices in this Festival setting. A 150-voice choir of adults and children from Trinity and other area churches of AGO members will participate.

Serving presently as Cantor at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, MN, and director of the National Lutheran Choir, Cherwien has completed his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance, and his Master of Arts degree in theory and composition, both from the University of Minnesota. He has also studied for two years at the Berlin Church Music School in Germany.

He is the author of the book, *Let the People Sing*, a practical guide for those who lead congregational song, and has composed a popular series for organ, *Interpretations*, based on hymn tunes. He also serves as editor of the National Lutheran Choir Series of choral music published by Morningstar Music Publishers. Cherwien is a founding member of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians and served as its National President from 1993 to 1997.

Spotlight on Tim Braband

Our member of the month for April is Tim Braband, who has been serving St. James Lutheran Church, Gettysburg, as Minister of Music for 30-plus years. During the past fall and winter he has undergone some serious surgical procedures, and is now taking a well-deserved, three-month sabbatical leave. Some of us experienced his skills and musicianship when he conducted a portion of our Anthem-Sharing Workshop on a Saturday morning in Allendale in the not-toodistant past.

Tim grew up in Rockland County, New York, and attended Good Shepherd Lutheran in Pearl River, NY, where he was both baptized and confirmed. He reiterates, "Church was an important part of my growing up years. I sang in the children's choir, and then the youth choir, as well as participating in all things musical in public school life." When Tim was in the youth choir, his church organist suggested that he take piano lessons.....which he did! Then he suggested organ lessons. This organist's name was Walter Powell, former organist at St. John, the Divine, as well as a student of Louis Vierne. Tim comments, "Mr. Powell was a delightful teacher and impressed upon me the importance of good hymn playing and the importance of poetry."

During Tim's senior year in high school, he was allowed the opportunity to play the weekly Matins Liturgy from the **Service Book and Hymnal**...complete with Anglican chants...in exchange for organ and piano lessons. "What a deal!" recalls Tim. "In addition to my musical pursuits, I was quite the mathematician. The musical muse was more of a call, however."

He had thought about college, believing he was not quite cut out to be a music conservatory student, but he desired broader liberal arts education. With this in mind, he applied to Susquehanna University, and was accepted. There he studied organ with James Boeringer. Tim thought that public school music education was his goal, but the organ study and strong connection to church work was always ever present.

During his college years, he served the First Presbyterian Church in Sunbury, and the First Baptist Church in Lewisburg. He considers himself fortunate to have studied choral conducting with Cyril Stretansky, Susquehanna University's noted choral director.

Upon graduation, the need for public school choral directors was not so great, so he pursued full-time church work at Atonement Lutheran Church in Wyomissing, PA. He has done additional graduate summer study at Westminster Choir College in New Jersey, and always enjoyed attending summer workshops with Robert Shaw and Frauke Hasseman.

The creation of a full-time music position opened at St. James Lutheran in Gettysburg in September of 1975. He is proud to say he was called to this position and the congregation just celebrated with him his 30th anniversary in September by honoring Tim with a commissioned anthem by Donald Busarow, as well as a financial gift.

In addition to serving as principal organist at three weekend liturgies, Tim directs the five vocal choirs and plans each of the liturgies in consultation with the pastors. He is a member of the Leadership Program for Musicians Advisory Board and Faculty.

And something that is different from any other member for whom I have been honored to write a biographical sketch – Tim has been a member of the Gettysburg Fire Department for 29 years, having held the office of President of that group for 13 of those years!

Tim's wife, Barbara, also an accomplished organist, teaches a full piano studio. They are proud parents of two grown daughters, one who works with Lutheran World Relief, and the other, who is an investigator in the Washington, D.C. area.

Enjoy your sabbatical refreshment and rejuvenation, Tim, and we will welcome you back after Pentecost Sunday to again join us in our member events. Thank you for your 30 years of contributions to the church music efforts in Central Pennsylvania.

Have You Seen This?

Have you ever purchased any of the collections entitled "11 Compositions for Organ" by Charles W. Ore? These pieces are in seven volumes and are quite different from the placid mu-



sic we do at times. Most of these voluntaries are a bit dissonant, or written in a style I found to be slightly different from the norm. I have owned Volumes I through VI, and recently purchased Volume VII, which is numbered 97-6988 at Concordia Publishing House.

The first selection is not your run-of-the-mill setting of "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound" (NEW BRITAIN), and is registered for SWELL: Secondary Plenum with Reeds, GREAT: Reed Plenum without highest Mixtures, and PEDAL: To Balance with SW to PED & GR to PED. It is written in 3/2 rhythm with triplets abounding on the manuals, as well as the pedals. The marking is 'with a swing; not rushed'. It is five pages in length and needs *PRACTICE*, but would be a rewarding piece.

"Crown Him with Many Crowns" (DIADEMATA) is two pages in length, using Reed plenum and Pedal ad. Lib. This is a rather easy work that is to be played 'with energy'.

Our third voluntary, "When in Our Music God Is Glorified" (ENGLEBERG), is six pages in length, and is to be played with 'broad, sweeping melodic phrases'. This selection is **not** for those who have no time to practice. It will require time and finger-markings galore to master. It also ends with double pedaling in fifths!

"Praise Him" (HAL'LUHU) is a four-page setting of Psalm 150. It begins with SWELL: Flutes 8' & 4', GREAT" Reed 8', and PEDAL: 16' & 8'. The notes are eighths and sixteenths with a few quarters and thirtyseconds thrown in to keep you awake. The easiest part is the pedal, so once you've mastered the manuals, you will have fun putting it together.

"Alleluia! Sing to Jesus" (HYFRYDOL) is three pages in length. It is registered thus: SWELL: Flutes 8' & 2' or 8' & 4', GREAT: Reed 8', and PEDAL Flutes 16' & 8', and is to be played in a "lightly detached style". The most difficult thing to do will be marking in your fingering. Then, go to town!

"O Day Full of Grace" (DEN SIGNEDE DAG) is

the sixth piece and is registered for SWELL: Secondary Reed Plenum, GREAT: Reed Plenum, and PEDAL: To Balance. The first page has no pedal part, but the melody appears in the pedal on page two. The pedal takes a rest, then makes a final appearance on the last page for two notes.

The seventh composition, "O God of God, O Light of Light" (O GROSSER GOTT) is only two pages in length. It is registered for SWELL: Secondary Plenum, GREAT: Reed Plenum, and PEDAL: To balance. There is minimal pedaling in this selection, and you will find it one of the easier ones in the collection.

"Rejoice, O Pilgrim Throng" (MARION) is the eighth voluntary, four pages in length and a well-known hymn tune. It is registered for SWELL: Second Plenum, GREAT: Reed Plenum, and PEDAL: To balance. If you enjoy syncopation, this one is for you.

"Grant Us Peace" (SIM SHALOM) is a lighter voluntary with little pedaling. The registration is SWELL: Reed 8', GREAT: Principal 8', Flute 4', and PEDAL Flutes 16' & 8'. This piece is to be played with a <u>'gentle,</u> <u>flowing pulse'</u>. It is interesting to do some Jewish music in a Christian setting for a change of pace. I remember doing many tunes that have stayed with me from my days playing in the Synagogue.

Our next composition is "*The People of Israel Shall Keep the Sabbath*" (V'SHAM'RU), another well-known Jewish melody. It is registered for SWELL: 8', 4', 2 2/3', 2', GREAT: Bright 8' & 2', and PEDAL 16' & 8'. Three pages in length, this selection is easy, and requires very little pedaling--mainly whole notes.

Our final work is seven pages in length and would make a wonderful recital piece. "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" (CONVERSE) is registered for Manuals: Reed Plenum; coupled, and Pedal: Reed Plenum. It is to be 'played with energy, but not rushed'. For those who have been looking for a challenge, this is it. It will require quite a bit of work, but perhaps you are one of the members that would like to prepare it for the next member recital!

If you do not have time to practice, or do not enjoy practicing, then this collection is NOT for you. *If any of our Chapter members would like to peruse Ore's music, I have volumes I through VII in my library. Just give me a call.*

Karen Appel, Harrisburg, has been a student of piano, voice and organ. She is currently studying voice with Marjorie Waltman of Harrisburg. Her musical talents were nurtured by her parents at a young age. Her mother was an alto soloist and her father and grandmother were church organists. She began studying piano at the age of 7 and went on to organ and voice lessons while in the ninth grade. In high school, she participated in district and regional chorus, was a guest soloist at various churches, and accompanied local high school graduations, the YMCA Boys Chorus of York and was a substitute organist in the York area.

Karen spent part of her musical life in theater, having been in York Little Theater's Camelot and Mechanicsburg Little Theater's production of The Fantastics. She was a soloist in the Hershey Community Chorus and toured with them in Spain and Poland. Her singing took a back seat to the organ when she became a full time organist and choir director. After several years, she went back to being a substitute organist and devoted more of her time to voice. She graduated from the Lebanon Valley Church Music Institute program where she divided her studies, one year of organ and one year of voice training, at which time she studied with Vicki Rose.

Karen is a member of the Harrisburg Chapter, American Guild of Organists. She is a soloist at Grace United Methodist Church on State Street in Harrisburg, and has done solo work for St. Catherine Laboure Roman Catholic Church, Good Shepherd Roman Catholic Church and the Cathedral Parish of St. Patrick.

Ralph Kneeream, Carlisle, was born and raised in Reading, Berks County, graduating from the Reading Senior High School in 1951 with honors in music. He earned a Bachelor's Degree and a Master's Degree in French Language and Literature from Columbia University. He holds a Doctor of Music Degree from Northwestern University. His principal organ teacher was Dr. Claire Coci, and he was Searle Wright's assistant at St. Paul's Chapel, Columbia University from 1958 until 1966. He has held Organist/Choir Director positions in Churches and Temples in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Illinois, and Florida.

As an organ recitalist, he has concertized in the United States and Europe, including three recitals at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris. As a teacher, he has taught at Blair Academy, Columbia University, Middlebury College, Northwestern University, the University of Michigan, and The Harid Conservatory. He has translated from the French and edited *Recollections* by Marcel Dupré (Belwin-Mills, 1975), *César Franck* by Charles Tournemire (University Microfilms International, 1989), and he has contributed numerous articles on various musical subjects to several professional magazines.

Dr. Kneeream is a member of the American Guild of Organists, the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Organ Historical Society, and he was elected to Pi Kappa Lambda, the National Music Honor Society. He is on the boards of the American Center for Church Music and the International Association Maurice and Marie-Madeleine Duruflé. Dr. Kneeream has enjoyed personal and professional relations with several of France's celebrated *personages* of the 20th century French organ world, namely Marcel Dupré, Mme. Charles Tournemire, and Maurice and Marie-Madeleine Duruflé. He has devoted both time and effort to a better understanding of both the Classical and the Symphonic French Organ Traditions. Dr. Kneeream is a former sub-dean of the New York City AGO Chapter and a former dean of the Palm Beach County AGO Chapter. He is the Organist of the First United Methodist Church of Carlisle.

Ronald Sider, Dillsburg, has been organist-choirmaster at three major Harrisburg churches during the past 46 years, while at the same time teaching at Messiah College for 45 of those years. He earned all his degrees through Ph.D at Eastman School of Music. At Messiah, he taught courses in Music Theory, Organ, Conducting, Church Music and Choirs. In his nine years as chairman of the Messiah music department, the department grew to its largest size. For 20 years, he also was music director of the radio program "Music from Messiah College." He holds the AAGO certification in the American Guild of Organists, and has composed and edited choral anthems by various publishers, as well as articles on Central American Music for professional journals and music books.

Besides his church music and teaching careers, he founded and directed Messiah's Polyphonic Choir for ten years, directed Grantham Oratorio Society for 28 years and their Concert Choir for three years. Involved also heavily in community musical conducting, he founded and directed the Harrisburg Singers, a professional group, for eight years, and the Central Pennsylvania Oratorio Singers which performs major works with orchestra. He was also the chorus master for the Harrisburg Civic Opera for a year. The "Ronald R. Sider Music Scholarship" was established by the Grantham Oratorio Society in 1996, and in 1998, Ron was awarded the "Messiah College Alumni Appreciation Award" for distinguished service to the College.

Ron is married to Beth, who teaches elementary school music in the Cumberland Valley School District, and they have two children, Rhonda Sider Edgington, a Fulbright scholar in Germany studying with Harald Vogel, and Eric, a mechanical engineer with a degree in music from Berklee School of Music, who continues his study of trumpet in Boston.

Trindle Spring Lutheran Church has recently celebrated 240 years of ministry at the western edge of Mechanicsburg. In 1992 its historic old worship building was abandoned for a brand new structure built directly across the street. That old building has since been utilized by the Mechanicsburg Ministerium as an outreach ministry to the community.

In 1993 the W. Zimmer & Sons Organ Company, currently in Pineville, North Carolina, installed a free-standing two-manual and pedal pipe organ in the new chancel at Trindle Spring Lutheran Church. This organ consists of 1,056 pipes comprising 17 ranks.





The Gemshorn on this organ caught my attention with its gentle but substantial sound. I thank Chapter Member Zack Sten for sharing the instrument with me.
