Getting to Know. . .

. . .David S. Messner

I am not an organist, but I am an enthusiast of great pipe organs, great compositions for pipe organs, and great performances on pipe organs.

I was born on the square in Strasburg (PA) where my father and my uncle had a large country store. When I was about one year old, my father sold his interest in the store to my uncle and moved to Harrisonburg, Virginia for another business opportunity, and that is where I spent my childhood and adolescent years.

We lived in a new housing development, and the only other children in the neighborhood were two girls. I used to listen to the older of the two endlessly practicing her piano scales while I was impatient to play softball, and firmly resolved that I would never, never chain myself to such 'mindless' repetition. My parents did not contest my determination, but my mother, in particular, firmly governed the selection of music to which we would listen. She was an artist, and knew very little about music, but her brother had gone to Juilliard and Peabody, and we were given to understand at an early age that we would listen to the music he selected.

And so, my earliest musical memories were of Haydn string quartets on old 78 rpm recordings, Bach cantatas, Dvorak's Cello Concerto and the New World Symphony, Ravel's Mother Goose Suite, Handel's Messiah and many of his arias, wonderful recordings by Risé Stevens, Richard Tauber, and other operatic soloists of the day. I very much enjoyed this music.

One day at the age of 13, I rode my bike up the street, and noticed that one of the garage doors of a neighboring house had been raised, and the collegeage son of the family was standing at the entrance. I rode my bike up the drive to chat. He was standing in front of a pump (reed) organ in immaculate condition, and looking rather glum. I asked him who the organ belonged to, and he said that he had just bought it at a country sale when he nodded his head the wrong way. He looked at my bicycle and said: "I'll trade it for your bicycle." I said: "Done."

Although I still was not willing to devote time to master proper fingering by learning scales, that little organ fascinated me as I explored its dozen stops, muted as they were in their effects. I learned to play hymns and to read music at a low level of proficiency. Outside the doors of our house, gospel and country music ruled the air waves and the preferences of my peers. During my junior year in high school, I concluded that I really had no interest in gospel and country music, and that I would pursue my interest in classical music. Downtown one day, I bought an LP of Brahms' organ music, and thought that it contained some of the most beautiful sounds I'd ever heard. I wore it out.

I had decided to major in biochemistry in college, but after two years, I was tired of rote memory work and a lack of interest on the part of my professors in discussing questions about biochemistry that they felt were outside the scope of the class they were teaching at the time. I changed my major to philosophy, with an emphasis on the philosophy of science and the philosophy of mathematics. I pursued these interests for an additional $3\frac{1}{2}$ years of graduate work, but did not complete my degree. My topic was belatedly rejected as too ambitious for completion within the time parameters customarily approved for such purposes.

At the same time, both of my wife's parents had been diagnosed with terminal degenerative illnesses. Because she was the oldest in her family, we both felt some obligation to respond to that situation. And so, we moved to her home in Middletown (PA). I worked on her father's dairy farm for six months, which was a new experience for me, and then taught philosophy for a summer at Lebanon Valley College, and subsequently for a year in the Humanities Dept. of the Hershey Medical Center. I greatly enjoyed teaching, but didn't much care for the administrative politics I encountered.

In 1970, we bought a house we loved on North Second Street in Harrisburg, and lived there for 26 mostly enjoyable years. Although we hadn't been attending church, after we moved in 1970, we decided to shop for our preference, an Episcopal church. The first one we visited was St. Stephen's Episcopal Cathedral which, in those days, had a wonderful choir of boys and men. My wife and I were delighted, and looked no further. Subsequently, I joined that choir and sang under Michael Shoemaker's direction for more than 20 years. Our son was a boy treble in the choir for several years, as well. I could not fully convey to anyone how much I learned, not only about great choral music and composers, but Michael also taught me enough about organs to launch my growing interest right up to the present. Of the people I could credit for my interest in pipe organs and great organ compositions, I owe the most to Michael Shoemaker by a wide margin.

In 2003, Margaret and I attended the Great Lakes Regional Convention of the AGO in Cleveland and had a wonderful time. Last year, we attended the North Central Regional AGO Convention in Lincoln, Nebraska, and enjoyed it just as much. Once or twice a year, we attend an organ recital at the Kimmel Center in Philadelphia. We have visited the Taylor and Boody factory in Staunton, VA a number of times, and in Lincoln, we enjoyed a tour of the Bedient factory, listening to and talking with Gene Bedient. We hope to attend another one, next year.
