Memories of a Wonderful Friend

How I have been blessed to have Carolyn as a best friend for so many years. She came into my life when I moved to Mechanicsburg in 1968. When I transferred my AGO membership to Harrisburg, she was the first person to welcome me as she has welcomed new members for all the years she was a part of the organ guild. She has made an effort to get to know everyone in the guild through her gift of hospitality. She loved calling members on the phone to keep in touch and to hear from them what was going on in their lives. Always concerned for others, Carolyn reached out to everyone.

Carolyn was always there for her friends. Through the crises in my life, I could always count on a call from Carolyn. She held me up when our son was diagnosed with leukemia. She was there to cheer me on through two knee replacements. When I broke my wrist on a Saturday night in July, she was on the organ bench in the morning to play the service for me. Carolyn did not play the organ in the summers except in an emergency and this certainly was one for me. She did not play weddings after she retired from Trinity Lutheran and I knew better than to ask her to play a wedding for me.

Carolyn and I roomed together countless times at National and Regional Conventions. The first one together was in 1976 in Boston. It was extremely hot especially for Boston and we had to keep washing out our coolest clothing to make it to the many churches we visited, all without air conditioning. We always laughed about the one concert we attended at a church that had recently varnished their pews. At the end of the concert we stood up for a standing ovation for the choir that had performed and there was this loud noise as everyone's clothing peeled away from the pews. The choir from Kings College in England wore heavy vestments which should have made them pass out from the heat.

In our first fifteen years or so when attending AGO conventions we always marveled at the elderly folks who could hardly walk who came to the conventions year after year. About ten years ago we realized that we were they – elderly persons who could hardly get around but kept coming to conventions because we loved them. Sometimes we went early to a convention to enjoy the sights in a new city. In Denver, San Francisco, Houston, Chicago we took advantage of the city we were visiting to see more of the city than just churches. Carolyn was always the tour director and planned everything for our trip from getting the reservations in early for the discount, finding the best air fare, learning where all the venues were located when we arrived at the convention, finding restaurants to eat in, and my favorite – being sure we left the correct amount for the maid.

One of my husband's favorite memories is Carolyn's caring for him when we were at graduate school in 1986-87. She would send newspapers to him with all the Penn State news along with a video of the game. In Kent, Ohio it was not possible to see the Penn State games on T.V. Who else but Carolyn would do such a loving thing for someone?

Carolyn and I went to so many concerts together here in our area. We always felt safer being together if we were going to a concert in Harrisburg. However, we never worried about safety issues when we were in convention cities. We walked in all sorts of neighborhoods where we should not have been. I know she will be hearing and being a part of many concerts in heaven.

I admired the many years that Carolyn was a substitute organist for many churches in our area. She had so many funny and exasperating stories to tell almost every week that she played. It was something that she enjoyed doing because of the person she was. I know that when I retire in two years, I will not be doing that kind of work. The stress of playing in churches you have never been to before is something that I could never take on but Carolyn enjoyed.

I will always treasure these and many more memories of Carolyn. She was one of a kind.



Getting to Know Tom Mercer by Mary Jane Nelson

Tom Mercer became a church musician more or less by accident. In 1968 a small Presbyterian church in a small Lancaster county town was quite desperate for an organist. Someone in the church knew that Tom had played the piano as a child and suggested approaching him about the job. What they did not know was that when he was six he had experienced a brief but lifechanging encounter with an elderly Hammond and played John Thompson's Birthday Party ("Here we go, up a row . . .") on the pedals. So he was unable to resist the Presbyterians' offer, even though what they were offering was \$25 per month.

The organ was a Möller "Artiste", the deluxe model with four ranks, duplexed over two manuals and pedal; the pipes were in the attic and spoke through a grill in the ceiling. Legendary Lancaster music store proprietor Dale Hershey suggested some anthologies of easy music; the Lancaster public library had a remarkable assortment of books on the organ and organ music. Tom developed a technique of playing legato until he ran out of fingers, then leaping to a new hand position.

After a couple of years the choir director retired and Tom was asked to take that responsibility as well. The stipend increased proportionally to \$50. In 1971 the pastor showed Tom a flier he had received in a bulk mailing from something called the Lancaster Chapter A.G.O. The flier announced a series of workshops for the amateur organist and the pastor suggested that Tom attend.

The chief presenter at the workshops was Carl Schroeder. Tom soon began several years of lessons with Carl, learning the amazing trick of working out and writing in the fingering and then practicing slowly with the metronome and he joined the Guild. Carl also showed that it was possible to play the most unwieldy and mechanical of instruments expressively.

In 1972, through the offices of the Chapter, Tom got a new job as organist at a much larger church in another Lancaster County town with another Möller four or five times the size of the first. When he was hired he was paid the same salary as the previous incumbent because "that's all that's in the budget," but was promised (orally) that there would be a substantial raise in the new budget. When January came he was told that the salary would be the same since "you've only been here a few months." He immediately began looking for another job, but it took two years to find one. In February 1975 Tom began what turned out to be 21 years as organist and choir director at First English Lutheran Church in Columbia. The church had suffered a fire and was using a small electronic with short offset manuals and thirteen pedals, but thanks to the insurance adjuster, in May they received their new organ – a Zimmer of 23 ranks, entirely straight. At Tom's insistence, Zimmer was persuaded to add a Sw/Gt 16' coupler. Tom's nagging also led to revoicing the larger flues until they produced more tone than air noise, and within a reasonable time after depressing the key.

The organ's most impressive feature was the pedal Fagot 16'. Franz Zimmer suggested that since most of the parishioners would likely never have heard a stop like that, perhaps Tom should delay its use for a few weeks. Tom felt the organ should be shown to its fullest advantage at its debut, and chose the Buxtehude *Prelude, Fugue and Chaconne* for the first prelude. So the first sound the congregation heard was the Fagot with the pedal chorus that included its own mixture!

All good things come to an end, and by the 1990s the church, through a period of frequent clergy changes and internal strife, had declined to where weekly attendance was around 40-50, eight to ten of them in the choir. In 1996 Tom took his current position at Ascension Lutheran Church in Willow Street, PA (*surprise....there is no Willow St. in Willow Street*) a growing suburban congregation with three services and multiple choirs that has twice enlarged the building in the past ten years.

From the earliest days Tom has had an interest in early music and its peculiar instruments. While at the Presbyterian church in the late 1960s he formed a recorder ensemble and made arrangements of hymns and songs for the amateur musicians to play. He still uses the alto and tenor recorders he bought at that time. In 1982 he was a co-founder of the ensemble Oriana. Their debut was at the Mt. Hope Winery for a single three-hour afternoon event that over the years gradually turned into the Renaissance Fair. Oriana's personnel has turned over many times, with Tom the sole remaining founding member. Oriana played at one of our Chapter banquets several years ago. To supply his own musical need, Tom turned to instrument building, making a number of harpsichords (some from kits, some from scratch) and two Medieval instruments that the group uses in their twice-monthly gigs playing for Roman and Medieval feasts at the "Catacombs" in Mt. Joy: a psaltery and a string drum, a.k.a. tambourin de Bearn.

Tom lists his other interests as reading, solving word puzzles, (especially British-style cryptic cross-words), and bird watching. In pursuit of birds he travels two or three times a year to Cape May, New Jersey, the bird-watching capital of eastern North America, where it's easy in a few days to see 150⁺ species. He also leads bird-walks for Ascension Church.

During all this time Tom has been active in the Lancaster Chapter, playing in recitals, presenting programs on various topics, and serving three terms as Dean and eight years (on and off) as secretary and newsletter editor. Several years ago he joined our Harrisburg Chapter as a dual member and served as co-chair of the publicity committee for the POE at Lebanon Valley in 2001, co-sponsored by the Lancaster and Harrisburg Chapters.

We welcome Tom as a dual member and hope that more of the Harrisburg Chapter members learn to know him in the future.

AGO NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON OR-GAN PEDAGOGY TO BE PRESENTED IN COOPERATION WITH YALE UNIVERSITY

Teaching Church Music in North America: An Old Vocation in a New Millennium March 11–14, 2009, New Haven, Conn.

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) and Yale University are partnering to produce the 15th AGO NA-TIONAL CONFERENCE ON ORGAN PEDAGOGY, March 11–14, 2009. The conference, designed in cooperation with the AGO Committee on Continuing Professional Education, will be hosted by the Yale Institute of Sacred Music, an interdisciplinary graduate center dedicated to the study and practice of sacred music, worship, and the arts. The four-day conference will be held at the Institute, in the Sterling Divinity Quadrangle, as well as other locations at Yale University and in downtown New Haven.

Demographic, cultural, and theological shifts in recent years have had a great impact on Christian worship in North America. This conference will explore these factors, and participants will discuss the many opportunities and challenges involved in the field of church music today. These proceedings will be of interest and value to church musicians and those who train them.

The keynote address will be given by Martin E. Marty. The conference will include plenary sessions led by Marva Dawn, Quentin Faulkner, Robert Rimbo, and Don Saliers; master classes on teaching by Lorraine Brugh (global music), David Heller (hymn-playing), Mark Miller (Gospel accompaniment), Thomas Murray (choral accompaniment), and Bruce Neswick and Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra (improvisation for church musicians). Church music curricula will be presented by Michael Bauer, Lorraine Brugh, Craig Cramer, Peter DuBois, and Janette Fishell. Preceding the pedagogy conference there will be a three-day symposium on preaching and music: Listening Is Performing, Performing Is Listening, March 8–10.
