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Getting to Know David Hoffman



Retired librarian David Hoffman is a long-time fan of the pipe organ, one who has but for a single exception been in the audience rather than at the console. David grew up in Brownwood, Texas, studied piano there for a few years while in school, graduated from Davis and Elkins College in West Virginia, and earned a master's degree in Library Science at Western Reserve University, in Cleveland.

It was at Davis and Elkins, where he sang in the choir at the local Episcopal Church, that he was pressed into duty one Sunday (when the organist was ill and there was no other substitute available), agreeing to accompany hymns and responses. That service being over, David decided that for the sake of church music and his own reputation it would be known as his last public performance on the organ.

His interest in organ music has been kindled for years through friendship with a classmate from his home town, always an organ student, who after some years of university teaching (not in music) settled down in Austin, Texas, as an organ builder, and still cares for a number of church organs in west Texas.

When David went from West Virginia to Cleveland he had his first opportunity to hear great music live. Monthly organ recitals at Trinity Cathedral and at the Cleveland Institute of Art, and oratorios at Old Stone Church on Public Square and at Church of the Covenant on the Western Reserve campus, with the gaps filled in by attending occasional concerts by the Cleveland Orchestra, George Szell conducting, whetted an appetite not sated more than fifty years later.



David's career in libraries took him to Dayton, Ohio; Madison, Wisconsin; Chicago, Illinois; Helena, Montana; Salem, Oregon; and finally to Harrisburg, where he came to work at the State Library in 1975. Along the way he sang in church choirs and in civic choruses, performing with the local orchestras in Dayton and Madison, and in the first production of the Madison Opera, and was a community member of the chorus at Carroll College in Helena, which performed occasionally with the visiting Spokane Symphony.

In Helena he had the use of a Hammond Home Model organ for a year while a colleague was on leave, but though fascinated with the possibilities of the draw-bars, never managed to master the pedal board.

In Harrisburg, David was Director of the State Library from 1981 until his retirement in 1994. At the Library, David oversaw the introduction of the computer catalog and the first phases of a statewide newspaper cataloging and microfilming program funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and several private foundations.

From 1981 until 1985 he was a volunteer programmer-announcer for radio station WMSP. Since 1994 he has been an occasional office volunteer for the Harrisburg Symphony and was for a dozen years a member of the board of Market Square Concerts. He also has served on the Harrisburg Opera board, and has been a panelist for the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts and for Allied Arts.

In retirement he has also dug deeper into family history, publishing journal articles on his father's grandfather and his mother's grandmother, as well as a 800-page McKee family genealogy, and will later this year see publication of his father's World War II letters from Europe.

David and his partner Charles took part in the organ crawls to West Point and to Princeton, before David joined the local chapter as a Special Member. He and Charles have welcomed the increase in number of organ recitals in the area over the past few years, and regularly attend recitals, orchestra, opera, and chamber music performances locally and in the northeast. Preparing to go to Paris a few years ago, Charles was listing museums and other points of interest to be seen, while David vowed he'd just go to St. Sulpice, and sooner or later someone would come to play the organ. It wasn't quite that simple; they had to go to Sunday Mass first, and then hear an organ recital, but at St. Clotilde, sure enough, they went in and took a seat on a weekday afternoon, and presently an organist came to practice. Such delight!

Minutes of the January meeting were approved on a motion by Charles Yocum and a second by Ray Edmison. Welcome AGO National President to Chapter Banquet

Eileen Guenther, newly-elected President of our National American Guild of Organists, returned from South Africa just in time for Inauguration Day, her fifth such trip. She is so impressed with the music, culture, and beauty of South Africa that she regularly leads immersion trips for Wesley Seminary to that country. She notes in her remarks in the February issue of *The American Organist*, that South Africa's struggle out of apartheid mirrors America's Civil Rights movement, and she has learned a lot from the people there about reconciliation and forgiveness.

Residing in Vienna, Virginia, her current employment is as Associate Professor of Church Music and Director of the Summer School at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, DC. Formerly, she was Minister of Music and Liturgy at Foundry United Methodist Church, also in DC.

Her National AGO offices in the past include National Councillor for Organizational Development, National Councillor for Professional Concerns, National Vice President, and Chair of the 1982 AGO National Convention in Washington, DC.

In the caption under Eileen's nomination photo in TAO's April edition, she wrote: "Many feel the church today faces challenges unlike any since the 16th-century Reformation movements. The AGO also faces challenges, and will succeed in its mission only by finding new ways to increase the viability of the organ, raising the visibility of the organ, and equipping its members for the opportunities and challenges of our time."

Preamble: The purpose of the American Guild of Organists is to promote the organ in its historic and evolving roles, to encourage excellence in the performance of organ and choral music, and to provide a forum for mutual support, inspiration, education, and certification of Guild members. Voting members are entitled to enjoy the privileges and are expected to accept the responsibilities of membership in the Guild. Members shall be considered equally for Guild offices and participation in Guild activities. These are the rules that shall be considered binding upon all voting members in good standing.

- **RULE 1.** Members shall promote good working relationships within the American Guild of Organists and shall respect the employment of colleagues. Members shall address differences between themselves and other members by following the procedures outlined in the Discipline.
- **RULE 2.** Members shall not seek or appear to be seeking employment for themselves, a student, or a colleague, in a position held by someone else. Members shall apply for employment only for a position which the employer, with the knowledge of the incumbent musician, has officially and publicly declared vacant by announcement of the vacancy.
- **RULE 3.** In cases pending under the Procedures or in cases where the National Council has determined that a position has been made vacant by wrongful termination of a member of the American Guild of Organists, members shall not seek or accept regular or permanent employment for themselves, a student, or colleague at that Institution until the National Council is satisfied that differences between the Guild and the Institution have been resolved. Interim services may be provided for a period of 90 days.
- **RULE 4.** Members shall obtain the approval of the incumbent musician before accepting an engagement for a wedding, funeral, or other service requested by a third party. In such cases, the incumbent should receive his/her customary fee, and the third party is expected to provide it. It is the responsibility of the guest member to inform the third party of this rule. Members are advised to protect themselves as incumbents in this regard by negotiating employment contracts which secure these fees and which provide some responsibility, oversight, and control as to choice of music, etc.
- **RULE 5.** Members shall conduct professional activities with truthfulness, honesty and integrity, and shall maintain sensitivity in matters of a personal or confidential nature.
- **RULE 6.** Members shall not discriminate against others on the basis of race, national origin, age, religious affiliation, gender, marital status, sexual orientation, disability, or medical condition (including, but not limited to, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome).
