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From the Dean

Greetings! We had a tremendous start to our program year on August 23rd with our Member and Student recital at Derry Presbyterian Church. It was gratifying to see the excitement the members and students brought to the organ. We can all be proud of our chapter's commitment to providing six young people with organ instruction via the Shenk Scholarship. Allow me to pass along well-written notes from two of the students:

From Sarah O'Donnell:

Thank you once again for providing the wonderful Shenk Scholarship! This was my second year to get it, and it was wonderful both years! This summer, as well as preparing for the recital, I learned to play hymns. I also learned to play several 'all purpose' Bach pieces. In addition to hymns and Bach, I learned more about stops, and the uniqueness of the different pipes. I hope to continue with lessons this fall. Thank you for a wonderful experience!

And from Layton Graves:

This year I was honored to have received the Shenk Scholarship for the second year in a row. In the time period of the ten lessons, I was able to substitute for organist at my church twice. It was truly a great experience! With the help of my teacher, Mr. Frey, I was able to learn more than fifteen different organ songs this summer, all of which I got to play at my church. Without the Shenk Scholarship, I don't think that would have been possible. I have had a great time playing organ this year, and I'm looking forward to being able to continue studying the organ in the future. I am very thankful to have won it this year, and hope you choose me for it again next year.

I hope that I will see all of you at our October 10 Workshop about The Alexander Technique. Aren't sure what that is? Allow me to share a brief description of the "system."

The Alexander Technique is a method that works to change (movement) habits in our everyday activities. It is a simple and practical method for improving ease and freedom of movement, balance, support and coordination. The technique teaches the use of the appropriate amount of effort for a particular activity, giving you more energy for all your activities. It is not a series of treatments or exercises, but rather a reeducation of the mind and body. The Alexander Technique is a method which helps a person discover a new balance in the body by releasing unnecessary tension. It can be applied to sitting, lying down, standing, walking, lifting, and other daily activities, such as playing the organ.

Kay S. Hooper--teacher, author, performer—founded AllSense Press to fulfill the goal of publishing Sensory Tuneups. Articles by Kay have appeared in American Music Teacher Journals. The areas of learning in Sensory Tuneups come from 44 years of piano study, 33 years of piano teaching, and 17 years of Alexander work. She is certified by Alexander Technique International. She travels to universities and conferences as a guest teacher and is a member of the adjunct faculty of Susquehanna University.

Kay Hooper writes...

Playing the organ requires excellent balance, refined coordination and exquisite movements. Musicians often fail to think about themselves as people who move for a living, but we do. We move for hours, days, months, years, and even decades. Without a clear understanding of the structures involved in performance movements, musicians are likely to be technically limited and, in the worst cases, to become injured.

On October 10, I will be presenting a two-hour workshop introducing the concepts of the Alexander Technique, a 100-year-old process of movement education. As a certified Alexander Technique Teacher, I guide people out of tension and into freedom with gentle touch and words. I will work with volunteers at the organ to demonstrate the positive changes that come from releasing habits of physical interference.

Another element of the workshop will be basic body mapping. Science has proven that we move according to the way we think we are constructed. These self-representations are known as body maps. When the body map is wrong, the movement is wrong. When the body map is correct, the movement is ideal. I will bring 3-D models of the skeleton and ask participants to compare their ideas with the truth of the design. I will also present group movement experiences that demonstrate the power of improving the body map.

Please come with questions, problems and challenges related to movement in performance and teaching. I will be glad to address as many as time allows.



Paris Organist, Olivier Latry to Perform at Trinity

The 2009/2010 Trinity Concert Series continues on Friday evening, October 16 at 7 p.m. with a concert by organist Olivier Latry.

Latry, titular organist of the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris, is one of the world's most distinguished organists, not only in France, but in the international community as well. He was born in 1962 in Boulognesur-Mer, France, and began his study of piano at age seven and his study of the organ at age 12; he later attended the Academy of Music at St. Maur-des-Fosses, studying organ with Gaston Litaize. From 1981 until 1985 Latry was titular organist of Meaux Cathedral, and at age 23 he won a competition to become one of the three titular organists of the Cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris. From 1990 until 1995 he taught organ at the Academy of Music at St. Maur-des-Fosses, where he succeeded his teacher, Gaston Litaize. Since 1995 he has taught at the Paris conservatory.

Not wishing to specialize in a particular repertoire, Latry would like to be an ambassador of seventeenth to twenty-first century French organ music, hence his equal devotion to the art of improvisation. Today he is counted among the most noted "improvisateurs" in the exceptional French tradition from Charles Tournemire to Pierre Cochereau.

Latry has performed in more than forty countries on five continents, appearing most often in the United States. In 2005, Mr. Latry played a solo recital at Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles and opened the new Rieger organ at Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church in Pennsylvania. In 2006 he was the featured soloist for the opening of the new Dobson organ at Verizon Hall in Philadelphia where he performed for three sold out audiences in gala concerts with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

Latry and his wife Marie-Therese have three children and live in a little village outside Paris.

ACDA is extending its discounted ACDA member registration rate to AGO members attending the winter conference in Philadelphia. 
