Our mission is to promote the organ in its historic and evolving roles, to encourage excellence in the performance of organ and choral music, and to provide a forum for mutual support, inspiration, education, and certification of Guild members.

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From the Dean

The work of the Harrisburg Chapter's Board of Directors includes making wise decisions about the utilization of the Chapter's financial resources. Over the years we have all been the beneficiaries of monies received via special gifts and bequests, some of which are earmarked for various scholarship opportunities. Recent Board action has resulted in additional contributions to three specific Guild purposes. Allow me to share with all of you the particulars of those three "special" donations.

In December 1982, the Guild established the AGO Annual Fund - a campaign to generate contributions beyond dues from individual members, chapters, and businesses in fields related to organ and choral music. Monies raised through the Annual Fund support the general operating expenses of the national organization.

For a number of years now our chapter has contributed to the Annual Fund, and 2010 is no exception. Thanks to donations from chapters, individuals, and corporations the Guild has been able to subsidize membership dues, including reduced dues for senior citizens, students, and the disabled; member life, health, and disability insurance at low group rates; liability insurance for all chapter events and maintenance of tax-exempt status for all chapters. Also, the Guild has been able to undertake outreach programs to raise public awareness about the organ, such as Pipe Organ Encounters for youth and adults, the PipeWorks program for children, and the AGO Web site. These are but two (out of at least eight) programs that receive support from the Annual Fund.

Organ student attendance at the 2010 Convention is a top priority of the planners of the 2010 Convention. To encourage students to come to Washington DC, convention planners have created the Student Organist Participation List (STOPList) program, which offers special educational opportunities and accommodates organ students' budgets. The 2010 "stimulus package" features:

- A \$200 Student Registration fee (the lowest in ten years)
- Low-priced housing at American University campus, two Metro stops from the hotel
- Financial support from the 2010 Club and from AGO Chapters
- Relevant workshops on performing skills and career planning
- Opportunities to meet acclaimed artists and fellow students

The Harrisburg Chapter's Board has designated \$250.00 to the STOPList program which will pay a young student's registration fee and contribute to the student's lodging.

Our February Event

Easy Improvisation for the Church

Organist will be the topic of February's meeting of the Harrisburg Chapter of A.G.O. The presenter is **Dr. Robert Lau**, Organist/Choirmaster at Mt. Calvary Episcopal Church in Camp Hill. The meeting, scheduled for Saturday, February 6, from 9:30 – 11:30 a.m., will take place at Zion Lutheran Church, 2730 Booser Avenue in Harrisburg. Chuck Yocum, Organist and Choir Director at Zion, is the host.

Lau's work in improvisation began when as a freshman at Lebanon Valley College he accepted his first position as organist at Holy Trinity Lutheran in Lebanon. During the administration of communion he played standard organ literature and an occasional improvisation on a familiar hymn. He soon heard that many parishioners preferred the latter. This has led to a life-long interest in the art of improvisation. This culminated in many of these improvisations being refined into organ works now published by the leading music publishing companies in the United States.

The presentation will consist of a graduated process in which written hymns are embellished initially for accompaniment to singing. Additional improvisatory techniques will be examined to demonstrate further refinement resulting in works which could be used as preludes, offertories and/or pieces to be played during communion.

Dr. Lau has recently signed a contract with Paraclete Press for the publication of a book he has written on improvisation. Titled *A Practical Approach to Improvisation for the Church Organist*, the book is scheduled to be published in May 2010.



Trinity to Celebrate Candlelight Vespers

Candlelight Vespers (Evening Prayer) will be celebrated on Sunday afternoon, February 28, 2010 at 4:00 PM in Trinity Lutheran Church, 2000 Chestnut Street, Camp Hill. The 65-voice Chancel Choir and instrumentalists will present John Rutter's beautiful Requiem during the service under the direction of Timothy Koch, Director of Music. Dr. Susan Hochmiller, soprano, will be guest soloist. Donations will be received following the service.

From the beginning of the human race, people kindled lights as darkness approached. The service of light is a dramatic portrayal of creation, when in the darkness "God said, 'Let there be light'" and of the new creation, when from the darkness of death, God called forth His Son. The darkness of chaos, fear and defeat, while strong and ever-threatening, is driven back by the coming of the light. The lighting of the candles is a re-enactment of creation and also of the resurrection. Thus death and resurrection are brought together by the powerful symbols of darkness and light.

The origins of Vespers can be traced to early Christendom in the Rule of St. Benedict written about 530-43. Much earlier than this we find an evening "Office" corresponding to both that of Vespers and of Compline (Night Prayer). Its name varies. In St. Benedict we find the name Vespera, which has prevailed. The name, however, by which it was most widely known during that period was Lucernalis or Lucernaria hora - so called because a number of candles would be lighted, not only to give light, but also for symbolical purposes. The Peregrinatio, which gives the liturgical order as practiced at Jerusalem in the 4th century, calls it Lichnicon. This Office took place at the tenth hour (four o'clock in the afternoon) and was also called the Office des lumières, (Office of the lights). It was celebrated in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre where all the lamps and torches of the church were lighted, making, as the author says, "an infinite light".

The Anglican Communion, Lutherans, some reformed churches, and, of course, Roman Catholics, model their Vesper services on the traditional Roman form. But from its traditional usage, the term Vespers has come to be used more broadly for various evening services in many churches.

Music Scholarship Opportunities Offered

The Guild was founded as both an educational and service organization, and seeks to set and maintain high musical standards and to promote understanding and appreciation of all aspects of organ and choral music.




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Sermons in Song: Studies of the Bach St. Matthew Passion Using a Liturgical-Hymnological Hermeneutic

The Early Music movement, in its pursuit of authenticity, nevertheless overlooks one aspect of the composer's intent. For what purpose did Johann Sebastian Bach write the St. Matthew Passion? Art for its own sake, as concert musicians understand it, did not apply at all to this work.



Bach's faith profoundly informed the music that he wrote for worship in Leipzig. In treating the St. Matthew Passion as concert music, church musicians have lost touch with the foundation upon which Bach built this monumental work. The context of its composition, a Vespers service in 1727, was certainly a more lengthy worship service than the average modern congregation could have borne. However, with attention to the carefully crafted links between the Biblical text and the libretto, the implications for modern church musicians become plain. An informed study of the text, along with an improved sense of the original context of the work and its immersion in Christian theology, can serve to improve the authenticity of even the most secular concert hall performance.

For orthodox Lutherans, including Bach, music was a deliberate expression of faith as part of a worship service. As such, use of the vernacular language of the people of the time was necessary for the corporate witness that Luther espoused. The Passion oratorios served as an exposition upon the events of Holy Week; they to amplify or reinforce the thesis of the sermon at the Friday evening Vespers service. The St. Matthew Passion even copies the formal design of an orthodox Lutheran sermon. Within the various parts of its

overarching structure there are smaller forms, including an allusion to a form of Hebrew poetry, that would have been familiar to theologians in Leipzig.

For those who had less training in homiletics or literature and history of the Bible, Bach's texts and music expressed a warm, living devotion. He had many Lutheran chorales at his disposal to provide textual and musical allusions to complex ideas beyond the scope of a single hymn verse or a few lines of an aria. But even the recitatives and arias served as reflections upon the Biblical text, and in so doing, hewed to Martin Luther's objective of a single corporate expression of faith. Without uttering a sound, the congregants at that worship service participated through their own recognition of the German chorales in the oratorio Passions, which was Luther's purpose in creating and assembling a repertoire of music for the people in their own language.

Christian Friedrich Henrici, the poet who composed librettos for many of the cantatas and both of the extant Passions, worked closely with Bach. They shared books on theology, including a collection of Luther's sermons. The Biblical text is not paraphrased at all, but is a precise copy of Luther's translation of the Bible into the vernacular German of his day. Henrici followed each event in Jesus' life with prayers and miniature homilies on the Biblical text. For the assembled listeners, hearing and understanding these prayers and reflections on the text must have been profoundly moving— dare one say it, dramatic. The entire experience of the Vespers service on Good Friday at St. Thomas Church served to keep the word of God "very near, in your mouth and in your heart," a command that Bach clearly took seriously.
