(A) Age 15-24 Years Old or (B) Young Professional-Age 32 and Younger

In celebration of the many talents of the young professionals in organ and church music in Region III, the Harrisburg American Guild of Organists Chapter is inviting interested young professionals (age 32 and younger) to submit a proposal to present a workshop at the Region III Convention on June 27-30, 2011.

Candidates must have a permanent residence in Region III or attend a college in Region III. Topics may include any area of organ literature, pedagogy, or church music related topics.

To submit a proposal:

- 1. Send a 2 page draft outlining your workshop topic and the format that you plan to use. Be sure to include your name, address, email, and date of birth.
- 2. If possible, include a video tape or a handout for your workshop.
- 3. Include 2 letters of recommendation by professionals who have observed your scholarly activity and your ability to bring material alive in a workshop format (please do not read your paper at the workshop)
- 4. Send your proposal to Ralph Kneeream, Region III Workshop Committee, 304 Forgedale Drive; Carlisle, PA 17015.
- 5. All proposals must be received by January 15, 2011.
- 6. The proposals will be reviewed by a committee and two contestants will be selected to present their workshop at the Region III Convention (one from the 15-24 year old category; and one from the Young Professional category-32 and younger category)
- 7. All entrants will be notified by Feb. 15, 2011.
- 8. The selected clinicians will receive a \$250 honorarium after their presentation at the convention.

- ⇒ "Why do some tunes work, and why some don't." Each text carries its melody, the composer's job is to find it. Yet, some melodies seem to sing themselves, some are very difficult to sing. A composer shares thoughts about melodic shape, how to appreciate good melodies (and perhaps identify why some aren't).
- ⇒ "Pairings" Our hymnals are full of hymn texts sung to melodies of completely different origins. What makes a good pairing, and what considerations should occur in putting a text with an existing tune.

Sunday, November 14, 4:00 PM

A hymn festival, "Christus Rex," traces the church year which began with Advent nearly one year ago, and culminates this November with Christ the King. Hymns from a variety of times and places will be sung, including a new text and tune by Susan and David Cherwien, "Come, Let Us Sing."

David Cherwien is cantor at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, director of the National Lutheran Choir, well-known throughout the country as a church music clinician, prominent composer of both choral and organ works, and an outstanding improviser on hymn tunes. Susan Cherwien is a freelance writer and musician who has composed numerous hymn texts that have been published in numerous denominational hymnals.

In 2007, Mr. Sheehan toured England with the Trinity Church Choir (under the direction of Tom Whittemore), which included performances at St. Paul's Cathedral in London and Blackburn Cathedral and St. John's Chapel in Cambridge.

Restored and Expanded Sanctuary Organ at Camp Hill United Methodist Church

In 2009, Camp Hill United Methodist Church committed to a restoration of its 3-manual sanctuary pipe organ. Originally built by M.P. Moller in 1972, Opus 10835, 26 ranks, was designed by Ronald F. Ellis and former Harrisburg Chapter Dean Charles E. Stoops. Dr. Stoops also played the dedicatory service on December 10, 1972. An 8' Trompette en Chamade was subsequently added as well as two 32' pedal ranks. The organ included Swells I and II, Great, Positiv and Pedal divisions.

However, the aging mechanisms of the console were in increasing need of repair, and many of the parts were becoming more difficult and expensive to obtain. Research on a comprehensive approach to the organ work began in September 2007. Early in 2008, a Pipe Organ Restoration Team was formed



under the leadership of retired Bishop Neil Irons to evaluate the needs and possibilities. This group of 13 included members of the congregation and sanctuary choir (some of whom are organists also), Keith Roden, director of sanctuary music, Janis Martinez, organist, Brian Rice, chapter treasurer, and Mrs. Nancy Rohrabaugh who chaired the committee for the original 1972 installation.



A decision was made to merge the proposals of the R.J. Brunner & Co., Silver Spring, and the Buch Church Organ Co., Ephrata. This would include consolidation of the Swell I and II Divisions, addition of a new digital Choir Division, and retention of the Positiv Division playable on both the Great and Choir manuals as well as additional new pipe ranks on the Great and Swell, and additional digital voices on the Great, Swell and Pedal.

Subsequently, Brunner and Buch were contracted to work on this once-in-a-generation project. Brunner oversaw the pipe work, which included the addition of four new pipe ranks, cleaning and revoicing of all pipes, reconfiguration of pipe chambers, releathering, electronic Swell shades, and relocation of the

Trompette en Chamade (originally visible above the altar) to the pipe chambers.

Buch refurbished the existing console including Peterson solid state digital systems, and new keyboards, stop draw knobs, lighting, music rack, and expression and crescendo pedals. The console also includes 160 levels of memory with 12 general pistons (repeated on 12 toe studs), 6 Great, Swell and Choir pistons, 3 Positiv pistons and 4 Pedal pistons. The con-

sole also features a Piston Sequencer for next or previous preset combinations. The Custom Walker Digital Voices are based on samples from Aeolian-Skinner pipes by Walker Technical Company, and uses Walker Paradox Systems (WPS). Final voicing was done by Walker Technical Company personnel. Addition of a Music Instrument Digital Interface (MIDI) system permits the connecting of other digital instruments such as sound modules, keyboard and sequencer to the organ console.

The final result is a beautiful 32 pipe rank organ with 20 WPS digital stops. The blended instrument has a much greater presence in the sanctuary, expands the literature that can be played effectively, and provides greater congregational support.



The organ will be rededicated on October 24, 2010, at the 9:30 and 11:00 AM services. Bishop Irons will officiate at the services. Brian Rice, organist, and Janis Martinez, former organist, will perform pieces featuring various sound divisions of the organ as part of the rededication services. At 4:00 PM, Eric Riley, Director of Music and Organist, Market Square Presbyterian Church, Harrisburg, will present a recital as part of the Church's dedicatory celebration. A free-will offering will be received. A reception for the artist will follow. Additional information is available at www.camphillumc.org.
