Dr. Carroll has participated in more than 150 choral events including appearances at the NENC Southern Division convention, National Convention of the Intercollegiate Men's Choruses Association, two Carnegie Hall performances and a Christmas Eve nationwide broadcast on CBS television and international broadcast of the Armed Forces Network. His choirs have made eight international tours.

A past President of North Carolina ACDA, Dr. Carroll received the 2001 Lara Hoggard Award for distinguished service to choral music in the state. He has served as Editor at Hinshaw Music, Inc. since December, 1996.

Welcome Carol Hunter

Remembering how the Chapter encourages us to attend AGO Conventions and meet people from all over the country with musical interests, I had the pleasure of sharing a seat and a conversation with Carol on the June 30 trip from Harrisburg to



Annville. I have learned a lot more about her musical achievements since then, and one surprising connection with someone in my past and present.

Carol is now residing in her hometown of Elizabethtown. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Westminster Choir College, with concentration in voice (Lois Laverty) and conducting (Joseph Flummerfelt), and a Master of Conducting degree from the University of Maryland, College Park, (Paul Traver). She recently retired from a career in full-time church music ministry after serving four churches for 26 years. Her most recent position was as Director of Music Ministries at Williamsburg, VA United Methodist Church, where she developed a ministry of nine choirs, orchestra and a concert series. In September, she returned to hear Kimberly Marshall play the dedicatory recital on the church's new Peragallo pipe organ, a project Carol helped to initiate.

Previous to this, she served two churches in Northern Virginia and founded the Reston-based semi-professional choral ensemble VOCE, which she conducted for nine years. She also directed musicals and operetta, and was a performing member of The Friday Morning Music Club. In 1996 she was honored to be one of three conductors for the annual Messiah Sing-In at the Kennedy Center Concert Hall.

She lived overseas for eleven years, including Stuttgart, Tel Aviv, Bremen and finally Geneva, where she served as Music Director for both a church and a women's chorus. While there, she studied voice at the Geneva Conservatory with Ursula Buckel, did solo vocal work, including leading roles in Geneva Amateur Operatic Society productions, and played viola in a local symphony.

Since returning to Elizabethtown two years

ago, Carol continues to be called upon to lead workshops in vocal, choral and handbell technique as well as classes in classical music for lifelong learning institutes. She recently did some interim work at Christ Church, UCC, Elizabethtown, her home church.

Carol has a son, Matthew, who lives with his wife Claire, and son Sebastian in Ashland, Oregon. She enjoys concerts and recitals, opera, theater, art, travel, skiing, sailing, classic films, antiquing, gardening, cooking and reading. With all these interests, she still has the time and energy to be Secretary of the Board of Gretna Music.

As talented as Sam is in drama, it is great to know that his musically talented sister is now our Chapter member. Welcome, Carol!

Report from Shenk Scholar

This summer I received the Shenk Organ Scholarship. I was taught by Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman. I received a total of 6 lessons. I began by learning about pedal technique. Also, I learned about the proper technique for your hands, which was surprisingly different from piano. I also was taught how to do finger substitutions. All of this helped me to learn several songs, two of which I performed at the recital. My teacher also showed me how to adapt 4 part hymns so that I can perform them with only 2 or 3 parts being played. This will be useful because I will be able to play for my church. As my church has fewer and fewer organists, this will be excellent. Another thing I got to do was to play on different styles on organs. I played on the large pipe organs that are run on electricity as well as a more old-fashioned, Bach style organ. I also was able to see inside both of these organs to see how they worked. Dr. Moorman-Stahlman was an excellent teacher who gave me these opportunities. She was very patient and understanding. I would also like to thank the Chapter for sending us the wonderful CDs of the concert. This was a wonderful experience I hope I will be able to repeat.

Thank you for funding my way to the Delaware Pipe Organ Encounter this year. It was a pleasurable learning experience. Every student had organ lessons every day. My teacher was Marvin Mills.

Throughout the week we saw quite a few different organs. Different teachers would play a recital on the organs that we went to see. They played everything from classical Bach Fugues to Scott Joplin ragtime! After each recital, the students were given an opportunity to play the organs.

On the second day, we went to a high school, where they had a theatre organ. It made every sound imaginable! They showed a silent picture and one of the teachers played the organ along with the movie. It was very neat! Then we were given the opportunity to play the organ, and to go up to see the pipes.

The day after that we took a bus down to Baltimore, where we saw and heard an original E.M. Skinner organ. Then we went to see an organ builder's shop, and we learned about how organs are built. After we got back to Wilmington we played 'Organ Jeopardy'! It was a fun time!

We went to Longwood Gardens on the fourth day. We heard Nathan Laube play a recital on the organ there. He was amazing! Afterward we were given the opportunity to play the organ. I think that Longwood Gardens was my favorite part of the whole week!

On the last regular day, there were several workshops. One on hymn playing, another on harpsichord, and one on handbells. I went to the handbell class. It was very interesting and fun. We got to play handbells almost the entire hour, and we played several easy songs.

The final day was the recital. I played 'Antienne' from Naji Hakim's Mariales. It is a very beautiful piece, which I learned during my lessons in Delaware

Carlo Curley to Trinity Lutheran, Camp Hill





The organ at Christ Lutheran Church in Elizabethtown was originally installed in 1946 by M. P. Möller, Inc. (Op. 7298) to celebrate the church's 175th anniversary. This three-manual instrument replaced a two-manual instrument built by Möller and installed in 1908.

The Robert Benton Pipe Organ Service of Norristown rebuilt and enlarged the instrument utilizing Walker digital voices and in 2006 this instrument was dedicated and was a gift in memory of Pastor Henri A. Eberly.
