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From the Dean

The last time I chaired a meeting of an A.G.O. Chapter as its Dean was in the Spring of 1982, when my second two-year term as Dean of the Flint, Michigan Chapter expired. In my Virginia sojourn, I was District Convener in Virginia for eight years! I don't quite know how that happened! It certainly was not standard practice to allow someone to have such a long tenure without a break in such a position, but because of some strange circumstances, it did. In that job, I always admired the Richmond Chapter. It too was a dynamic, energetic group whose programs tended to be well attended and I enjoyed being with them. And to have the honor to lead such a Chapter... because I see Harrisburg as very similar... is indeed a pleasure.

Of course, the only reason this Chapter is such a wonderful group has to do with the leadership of the past. I look at my predecessors, and realize that I now stand in a long line of persons who had a real impact on church music in this region. I'll not mention them by name as I'm sure to forget someone, but I will thank my immediate predecessor, Dr. Ralph Kneeream for his superb three-year-term. Ralph left nothing to chance, and ran a tight ship, and it is a joy to inherit an organization that has had his steady hand on the rudder for those years.

Also, no Dean runs a Chapter alone. There are his or her fellow officers and the elected and appointed members of the Board. "The Top of Virginia - 2013"

We're ba-a-a-ck! and some are already planning next summer's journey to Boston! Composing this summary with 102 degree temperatures outside, including comments from some of the other 18 Harrisburg Chapter members in attendance, I am thankful that we had such wonderful weather during Convention days, even noting the occasional sprinkles! Following are some words from our colleagues on their individual musical experiences in Winchester.

"There's nothing like an AGO convention, where like-minded folks gather to meet new colleagues and visit with old friends and acquaintances. Winchester provided a delightful, charming, and historical environment where it seemed that everything presented was of stellar quality: from Nathan Laube's consummate artistry demonstrated at Trinity Church, Upperville, to the St. Paul's K Street choral concert conducted by Robert McCormick, to Jeremy Filsell's thought-provoking insights concerning music and liturgy articulated so beautifully, to Ann Elise Smoot's organ masterclass at Shenandoah University...to mention just a few. On a personal note, I enjoyed the Old Town section of Winchester where most of the venues were located, along with the Pedestrian Mall where I was fortunate to dine one evening at a wonderful restaurant named *II Violino*! This convention was described on more than one occasion as a big family reunion. I'm glad I could attend this one!" - Anthony Ciucci

"Most likely those members who attended the Region III convention felt the same thing as I did: a carefree feeling that we didn't experience two years ago when we hosted the convention, and all of us were making certain that everything went smoothly! The charming city of Winchester, VA, with its unique Loudoun Pedestrian Mall and seven churches within four walking blocks of the George Washington Hotel, was ideal for a convention. There were two highlights for me – the beginning and the ending, although everything in between was good also. David Cherwien led a hymn festival on the two-manual, 28-rank Schantz Organ, making the most of every sound on the instrument. His wife, Susan, provided many insights with her "reflections" following each hymn. Tuesday morning, Cherwien displayed not only his outstanding improvisational skills in a workshop, but also added some of his natural wit. The closing entertainment at the Luncheon Banquet, was by Mark Schweizer, director of St. James Music Press, and writer of the comic mystery series. He described how he came to write "*The Alto Wore Tweed*" and then followed with a most hilarious skit. The day before, at his anthem-reading workshop (showing a serious side of Schweizer), he asked for singers to be in a volunteer choir for his skit. One ditty they sang that continues in my head is "Polly Wolly Doodle Kyrie." At its completion, Mark Schweizer advised not using this at a Sunday service! One left Winchester with the sense that this was a great convention!" - Doris Savage

"Ann Elise Smoot, a recitalist and teacher, conducted a Master Class at Shenandoah University. She works with young organists in the UK and North America, preparing students for university organ scholarships. The three students that were selected for the class played Dupré, Couperin and Mendelssohn. The young man that played Couperin was advised to study French tapes or CDs, to read about Louis XIV, the Sun King, as this would help him to understand the music and the culture of the time. She gave important techniques to all three to improve their playing of the pieces. Dr. Shirley King, from our chapter, presented a session on Recent Organ Literature. She played selections from Paraclete Press, Morningstar and Zimbel Press. A few of the composers chosen were Lau, Biery, Diemer, Corl, Burkhardt, Powell and Callahan. One of the composers she selected, David Schelat, was present at the session. Shirley gave us a good representation of Music for the Church Year, of Hymn-based Works, and Collections, as well as Miscellaneous Organ Scores." - Judy Schrack

"I would list the opening service with David and Susan Cherwien as the most memorable program for the convention. The convention was well-organized and it was great to be able to walk from one venue to the next. The scheduling was very reasonable and helped to keep things stay on time. Additionally, the creative programming that Julie Evans used of pairing a setting of a spiritual with a Bach piece was both interesting and provoked some interesting

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conversations."- Shirley King

[Julie Vidrick Evans, director of music at Chevy Chase Presbyterian in Washington, DC, entitled her program "Soul Juxtaposition: J.S.Bach and the Negro Spiritual". She paired "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" with BWV646; "Steal Away" with BWV690; "Were You There?" with BWV727; "Joshua 'Fit the Battle of Jericho" with BWV543; "My Lord, What A Mornin" with BWV645; and "Great Day" with BWV530.] for your use, if you wish. - mjn

"The highlights for me in Winchester were David Cherwien's leadership at the opening hymn festival, and his seminar on hymn playing and improvisation in hymn playing. His creativity at the organ left me breathless during the hymn festival, in addition to encouraging us to sing well. In his seminar he was so engaging and entertaining while teaching us in very effective ways. It was also encouraging to see the many young participants in our region, both in attendance and as participants in recitals. All of the recitalists were exemplary. I was proud of our own Tyler Canonico who wowed me with his playing of the Mozart "Fantasy" in the young performer's recital. I appreciated hearing the remarkable talents of many recitalists whom I've never heard before, and in addition to her recital, I appreciated the fine teaching demonstrated by Ann Elise Smoot in her masterclass." -Shawn Gingrich

And the last comment to arrive:

"Mary Jane, by all means tell the world about how good, imaginative and clever the "Phantom of the Opera" was!" - Delizia St. John-Brainerd

....and so I will. Paul Fleckenstein is organist/director of music at Westminster Presbyterian in Wilmington, Delaware, and is a past dean of that chapter. In addition to his fame as accompanist for "The Phantom of the Opera", he has performed in many venues from Washington National Cathedral to cocktail parties, and from the Wanamaker Organ to *Pipedreams*. His continuous flow of supporting accompaniment to the film was chock-full of vignettes from all sorts of organ literature that were instantly recognizable to the heavy-onthe-organ-side audience!

My friend and roommate for the convention had her "convention diary" written before I asked for comments. These are some of her recollections. "6th Dimension Handbells, six smiling lively ladies who ring 3 - 5 octaves of English handbells. Normally this would require 10 -12 ringers. Such numbers as Baby Elephant Walk, Sabre Dance and Chattanooga Choo-Choo show handbells are not just for religious and classical music. I loved it. Some years back I was a ringer, too.....Lecture about 18th and 19th century Pennsylvania German organ builders - Diffenbach, Krause, Tannenberg. A few playable instruments still remain....Festival Worship Service,"Sing to the Lord a New Song"– church musicians love to sing, and so we did! Dr. Eileen Guenther, AGO National President, spoke on the role of music and musicians in worship today. One of her comments: *Music matters*. I concur." - Mary Louise Tietbohl

Having had a choir director/organist as a husband for 34 years, I took note of some of the nuggets of knowledge that Robert McCormick emphasized in his workshop on creating a choral sound with a volunteer choir. Some of these rang very familiar to my ears, and some are worth repetition now and then.....meet singers where they are and help them to grow..... expect and demand more than singers think they are capable of..... always work hard NOT to be

frustrated.....introduce new music strategically but not stressfully.....most diction problems involve vowels....and pastoral skills to choir members are a necessary part of the director's job.

The Director of Music will collaborate with the Rector to develop a music program which enhances the spirit of worship and assists the entire congregation in experiencing and connecting with God. CALL FOR ENTRIES



Rodgers North American Classical Organ Competition

Rodgers Instruments Corporation established the organ performance competition in 2011 for the purpose of encouraging the development of young organists in North America. The NACOC is a showcase for emerging young performers that gives broader exposure to the modern classical organ and encourages the study of organ music. In 2012, Rodgers introduced a second division to the NACOC that provides added opportunities. Two levels of the competition are offered: Level 1 is for organists aged 18 and younger; Level 2 is for organists aged 19 to 35.

The NACOC is **FREE** to enter for residents of the United States, Canada and Mexico, and culminates in a public performance by six semi-finalists (three from each level) in the Rodgers auditorium in Hillsboro, Oregon, on Friday, October 4, 2013. The event is open to the public without charge, but seating is limited and reservations will be required.
