From the Dean

WORKING IN A HOLY SEASON ...

Last month I was proud to be the first to wish you a Merry Christmas. From one who often sends his Christmas cards on January 4 or 5, I rather enjoyed the irony of that greeting. In that column, I spoke about the 'mechanical' parts of finding our way through the season...good preparation, using the precious time we have wisely and other issues pertaining to the production of a finished product of which we can be proud in a timely manner. These are important issues for us as professional musicians.

However, I want to urge you to find ways to also celebrate this holiday for yourself. Over the years, I have found that I become so involved in making Christmas beautiful for others that sometimes it becomes a dreaded time of the year for me. Everyone else is looking forward to this experience, and I am being put on the spot to deliver the goods, and in doing so, find Christmas to be a disappointment.

I well remember as a child the great anticipation of Christmas Eve and spending it in church...coming home to open just one present...and retiring for a somewhat sleepless night anticipating the morning when we exchanged our presents and later in the day having grandparents and other relatives in the house which was filled with the smell of the roasting turkey and the stuffing...oh, the stuffing! It wasn't just a holy time, it was a magical time.

I realize that we can never recapture the absolute joy of a childhood Christmas as adults. But in our business, we often get to the point where we just want to see it over and done with. Reaching the Feast of the Epiphany unscathed is the goal. I have to admit, that there was a time when I had reached that point. I just wanted to get it done. I loved the music, but the hard work and tension of producing wonderful services for others took my own joy away...because I never stopped to realize that I had to find a personal way to celebrate this time of the year.

I can't tell you any magical formula for doing both the work of Christmas and celebrating it at the same time...but I do know you need to work at it. Otherwise this becomes drudgery.

I urge you to look for things that you think will give you a spiritual focus this holiday season. Seek out opportunities to be a part of the season instead of a provider of the season. If this takes the form of quietly going to a mid-week Eucharist, or a resolve to read a special book or the Nativity narratives from the Gospels...or to go away for a day of skiing (hoping not to break a leg!)...or to a tree farm to select a special tree that you and your family will spend a whole evening decorating and enjoying the fellowship. It doesn't have to be profound...deeply theological...or seriously musical. It just needs to be your own personal Christmas present to you...to have time to participate in the joy of the season as well as the work. At my house, our great joy is having the children descend on the house in mid-December and stay for a while...I'm just going to soak in all the noise and energy of having three generations in the house at one time. It makes my life seem 'normal' again, even as for most of the year I enjoy the empty-nest syndrome.

Find your own special thing and have your own special celebration this year. It will spill over into your work, too. And that's just an added bonus. When you get to Epiphany, I think you will then look back with joy on good work and good times that make this season worthwhile for all of us.

We will welcome Nicholas Capozzoli, winner of the Region III AGO/Quimby Competition, to our Chapter for a special recital on Saturday, May 31 at 7:00pm at Trinity Lutheran Church, 2000 Chestnut Street, Camp Hill.

A native of Pittsburgh, **Nicholas Capozzoli** is a junior at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where he is a student of James David Christie and is majoring in organ performance. He began his musical studies at the age of nine and received initial training from Liz Stumpf and Kathy English. He soon took an interest in the organ, and through the Pittsburgh Organ Academy of the Pittsburgh AGO Chapter, he studied with Richard Pinkerton. He is the first-place winner of several competitions, including the Pittsburgh



Concert Society Audition for Young Organists, the Carol Teti Memorial Organ Competition, the Blackwood Theater Organ Society Scholarship Competition, and the Music for Mount Lebanon Scholarship Competition. In August 2013, Nicholas played a recital at the National Association of Pastoral Musicians Convention in Washington, D.C. He has participated in masterclasses conducted by Jane Parker-Smith, Hector Olivera, and Jack Mitchener, and has performed in several venues, including St. Paul Cathedral and Heinz Chapel (Pittsburgh, PA), Bower Chapel (Naples, FL), and St. Peter Cathedral (Erie, PA).

From the Archivist ... THE YEAR 1938 From handwritten notes

Almost all of the notes for the year of 1938 were minutes of Executive Board meetings. It appears that most of their time was spent "discussing" matters such as programs and increasing membership in the Chapter. The programs for the year were organ recitals at various churches in the Harrisburg area and several "workshops" on organ playing and the meeting of the organists and clergy in a "Question Box" format.

It is interesting to note that these Executive Board meetings lasted as late as 10:30 p.m. and 11:30 p.m. The meetings were held at the homes of members of the Board, after which refreshments were served by the host or hostess!

The Board was asked by the National Office to suggest a site for the 1939 Convention. The Board recommended Philadelphia, and their choice of the site was sent on to the National Office.

In May the Treasurer reported a balance of \$40.86 in the treasury. The election of officers was held in May with the following results: Dean, Mr. Clarence Heckler; Sub-Dean, Miss Irene Bressler; Secretary, Mrs. Marshall Brown; Registrar, Miss Sara K. Spotts; Treasurer, Miss Doris F. Stuart; Auditors, Miss Laura Garman and Mrs. Harold B. Wood; Executive Board to serve three years, Mrs. John R. Henry, Mrs. Nelson Maus, Miss Laura Zimmerman.

The Chapter received an invitation to attend the Pennsylvania Association of Organists convention recitals October 3 and 4 of 1938.

Washington DC Organ Trip

Eleven Chapter members traveled to Washington DC on Saturday, November 9 for an organ crawl. Sub-dean Steven Middernacht was our driver and worked out the details of the day with our local host Dudley Oakes. Dr. Oakes is the vice president for Létourneau Organs and he lives and works

in DC. After we arrived in the city we were joined by two additional people, the sister and niece of Kathy Gates who live nearby.

Our first stop was at First Baptist Church where the resident organist Lawrence Schreiber served as our gracious host. Dr. Schreiber demonstrated the newly installed very large, five-manual, 114rank Austin organ, Op. 2795.

In addition to our time hearing and playing the organ, Chapter member Bob Carbaugh also shared his skills as an organ technician by assisting to stop a

cipher in the antiphonal divisions and by tuning two of the Trompette en chamade pipes.

Next we traveled to St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, where Dudley Oakes serves as the resident musician. There we heard and played the 29-rank, historic Hook & Hastings, Op. 1491 (1891). We also enjoyed our box lunches in the annex of this church before moving ahead.

Our next stop was at Ascension and St. Agnes Episcopal Church and the 55 -rank organ built by Orgues Létourneau, Op. 68. While we briefly met the resident organist, Dr. J. Owen Burdick, Dudley Oakes, whose company built the instrument demonstrated it for us.

At this juncture, Dudley departed to play for a Wedding and a Mass at his church and our co-host for the remainder of the day, Dr. J. Thomas Mitts, joined us to travel to the church he serves, Augustana Lutheran Church.

At Augustana Dr. Mitts ably demonstrated the 34stop Orgues Létourneau, Op. 66 mechanical-action instrument. The group requested that he lead us in a hymn and he wowed everyone with creative accompaniments to the hymn. He further wowed us with his efforts to serve us a pasta dinner before we departed.

The day was a great experience and we thank our hosts, all the churches

for opening their facilities, and our Sub-dean and chauffeur Steven Middernacht to make it all possible. Conversations began on the way home about where we might go on the next trip. Consider joining the fun next time!
