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From the Dean

of organists and churches ...

As we approach Lent, I have been thinking about the unique position in which members of the American Guild of Organists find themselves. Most of us work in a religious institution ... overwhelmingly, churches. I suspect few of us started our love affair with the organ with a full understanding of what the true implications of that decision would be vis a vis the relationship of our instrument to established religion.

By and large, we were drawn to the instrument for its grandeur ... perhaps a performance of the Widor Toccata, or one of the Chorales of Franck. We loved the beautiful English Horn, or Krummhorn or the strings, and the power of the reed chorus. In short, we were drawn to the instrument and looked upon this as a musical endeavor. And even though we likely studied with someone at a church, we were too young to take very seriously how deeply intertwined the life of the organist as a musician is with the life and worship of the church.

No doubt, at some point, each of us came to the realization that if we were going to play this instrument, we would have to make our peace with working for the church ... and most of us did not think about that too seriously! I know I didn't. I started out in my first church job at age 15 as an organist who happened to work for a church. I didn't take the church lightly, as I had grown up as a person of serious faith, but even having spent my youth as a boy chorister, I didn't have the faintest idea of the true nature of the relationship needed between a musician and the church s/he serves.

I would have to admit that even in my first couple of full time church posts, I thought of myself as a concert organist and conductor whose patron was the church. After all, wasn't that the traditional pattern of musical professionals? On the surface it would seem so ... but in reality, our musical forebears were deeply committed to the church and understood that their music served the greater purpose of the worship. Even Bach's magnificent Cantatas and Mozart's Masses were 'useful music' and geared toward use in their particular liturgies.

Over the years, I found myself 'wising up' a bit, and beginning to realize that the

music I played and directed was not a performance but an offering ... an offering of beauty and majesty brought before the throne of God to inspire and energize and enable His people in the principal act of humankind ... the worship of the Almighty.

As we each approach this holy season, I encourage you to look inward and find your own place of comfort in this unusual task. Not every organist is a deeply committed Christian ... but we can understand the work of the church, and the place we hold within the workings of that institution. I encourage you to go beyond your choir room and organ loft from time to time and venture into a Bible Study group, or a service project. Every so often I leave my office at noon and go across the street to Downtown Daily Bread and ask if I can just help out with the serving. It connects me to the greater mission of the church. It gives perspective. And I think we all need that perspective ... because without it we find ourselves defending 'great music' or in conflict with our clergy because we don't really understand our jobs in their entirety.

Being an Organist-Choirmaster is not an easy job. We are caught in a place between being an artist and a churchman ... and that's not an easy place to be. But the creative tension between the life of the artist and the life of the church makes for a thoughtful church musician, and that is a commodity the church greatly appreciates. In this Lenten season, let us try to establish this as the inner life we lead as church musicians. We might find ourselves a lot happier in our jobs.

ONCARD

Recently James Thomashower devoted his monthly column in TAO to an overview of the new Online National Collection and Remittal of Dues (ONCARD) system that will be rolled out this spring for the next fiscal year. There is a lot of good information in that February 2014 column, so be sure to read it thoroughly so you are not caught by surprise. Allow me to highlight a couple of items about the new system.

Starting April I, all dues will be paid directly to the national office, either with a credit card (the preferred method) or a check. Each AGO member will receive an invoice via email for the amount owed. Those members without email addresses will receive an invoice via US mail. Members will be able to review and update their personal information starting the first week of March. Have you moved recently, or changed an email address? Is your date of birth listed and correct? ONCARD uses your birthdate to calculate the correct member category. To update such personal information, go to <u>AGOHQ.org</u>, then go to the ONCARD link. Your login consists of your first initial and last name. The password is the unique number that appears on your TAO magazine address label. This online feature will be available beginning March I.

From the Archivist ... 1940/1941 Season From Handwritten Notes

The Executive Committee met on September 24, 1940, at the home of Dean Arnold Bowman. An invitation from the Lehigh Chapter to participate in the Inter-Chapter Conference to be held in Allentown on October 19 was read by the Dean. Mrs. John R. Henry was appointed to represent the Harrisburg Chapter and also to play in the recital at 4:30 that Saturday afternoon.

Neighborhood recitals were planned by the Chapter for surrounding towns.

The location and dates of these recitals was to be announced later. A choral program was also planned for the Spring at Market Square Presbyterian Church.

The next meeting of the Executive Committee was held on February 18, 1941, at the home of Miss Doris Stewart. Communications regarding the convention to be held in Washington during June were read by the Dean. The Dean of the newly formed Altoona Chapter and Dean Bowman planned a joint meeting to be held in Altoona sometime in May. Miss Stuart, Treasurer, reported a balance of \$64.51. Mr. John H. Treader (the name is not clearly written in the minutes), Rector of All Saints Church in Hershey, was appointed Chaplain to serve through September 11, 1942.

The final Executive Committee meeting of the season was held on April 21 at the home of Dean Arnold Bowman. Miss Doris Stuart, Treasurer, reported that there was a total of 60 members of the Chapter. The balance in the treasury was \$82.19.

The annual business meeting and election of officers was planned for May 27 in the Stevens Memorial Methodist Church. The banquet was planned for the week of June 9.

At the business meeting held on May 27 the following Officers and Board Members were elected: Dean, Miss Helen Runkle; Sub-Dean, Miss Ella Maye Foreman; Registrar, Miss Sara K. Spotts; Secretary, Mrs. Vivian Evens Steele; Treasurer, Miss Doris M. Stuart; Assistant Treasurer, Mrs. Marshall Brown; Auditors, Arnold S. Bowman, Mrs. Hazel A. Keeley; Executive Committee, Miss Dorothy A. M. Peters, Mrs. Charles Swartz, Henry Van Pelt.

The programs for the next season were not announced until the fall of 1941, which was the beginning of the next season; and these will be listed in the next Archivist report.

Shawn Gingrich demonstrated techniques to introduce handbell ringing to the inexperienced musician, along with rehearsal techniques to keep them ringing well. Eric Riley invited the group to "mix it up" for more effective rehearsals, as a conductor, a vocal coach, or as a rehearsal technician to keep from arriving in the proverbial "rut". Shelly Moorman-Stahlman encouraged teachers and students to make the most of practice time, including attitudes to induce concentration, and a list of Tricks-of-the -Trade for students to learn difficult Each presenter furnished a takepassages. home summary of their portion of the workshop, that may be very helpful in our collective future ventures.

"Evensong ... is a very tiny fragment of something else: It is a fragment of the worship which is offered to God by Christian people every hour of the 24 in every part of the world. When you come to Evensong ... it is as if you were dropping in on a conversation already in progress—a conversation with God which began long before you were born and will go on long after you are dead. Evensong is drawn almost entirely from the Bible. Its primary purpose is to proclaim the wonderful works of God in history and in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Its secondary purpose is to evoke from the worshiper a response of praise, penitence, prayer and obedience."

(A statement from Coventry Cathedral.)

It has been said that the service of Evensong has brought more of humankind to the church than any other form of worship. In its finest state, Evensong is a significant jewel in the crown of liturgical worship. It is an art form of rare and mystic beauty that transports the worshipper to the roots of the Anglican Church, when the most beautiful music of the late Renaissance period was composed specifically for Evensong.

Born from humble, monastic roots, this liturgy was formed into its current format by Thomas Cranmer, Archbishop of Canterbury during the reigns of both Henry VIII and Edward VI. Cranmer molded the first liturgy of Evensong from the Monastic Offices of Compline and Vespers, the last two Offices of the monastic day, and incorporated it into his "Book of Common Prayer" in 1549.

The service emphasizes scripture and is similar to the service of Vespers in the Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches. The traditional canticles, usually sung by the choir, are the *Magnificat*, the song the church remembers that Mary sang when the Angel Gabriel announced that she was to be the mother of Jesus, and the *Nunc Dimittis*, the song the church remembers that Simeon sang (Luke 2:29-32) when he beheld Jesus being brought to the temple to be baptized. Volumes of glorious music have been composed over the centuries as settings for the canticles.

WE INVITE ALL INTERESTED SINGERS FROM THE AREA TO JOIN US FOR THE CHORAL EVENSONG CHOIR. There will be two rehearsals for the Evensong on the two Mondays preceding the Evensong service. Participants are welcome to sing at either or both of the services.

Pipes in Proximity Emmanuel United Church of Christ, Hanover Skinner — Möller — Peragallo

Emmanuel United Church of Christ, formerly Emmanuel Reformed Church, traces its history back to 1765. The congregation now occupies the fourth building of its long history. The cornerstone of the Chapel was laid on Sunday, August 6, 1899 and the building was dedicated on Sunday, July 8, 1900. The new church cornerstone was laid on Sunday, November 18, 1900. The new church was



dedicated on Sunday, September 18, 1904. The architecture is Tudor-Gothic with a beautifully designed interior in the shape of a Latin cross with a clerestory.

Emmanuel had the first pipe organ installed in a Hanover church. It was built by David Tannenberg who designed and laid out the instrument. Before the instrument was installed, he died suddenly from a stroke while tuning the organ at Christ Lutheran in York. It was, therefore, completed by his partner and son-in-law, John Phillip Bachman. The Tannenberg organ was replaced by a 15-rank organ,

built by Johnson of Boston, which was installed in 1887. The Johnson organ served until 1912 when it was sold intact and replaced by an instrument built by Bates and Culley of Philadelphia. It contained 25 ranks, 1,841 pipes, playable from three 61-note manuals and a 30-note pedal board. The first diapason from this instrument now serves as the non-speaking gold facade pipes in the organ case. The Bates and Culley organ was replaced in 1929 by the four-manual, 38-rank, 2,536-pipe E. M. Skinner organ. In 1965, for the church's 200th anniversary, the organ was rebuilt

and enlarged by the Aeolian-Skinner Company. Nineteen ranks of E. M. Skinner

pipes were removed and twenty-five new Aeolian-Skinner ranks were installed, bringing the total ranks to 44 and the total pipes to 2,820. At this time the E. M. Skinner swell trumpet was moved to the antiphonal, replacing the tromba. The Harp and Celeste bars in the choir were also removed and sold. In 1972 the Moller company rebuilt and enlarged the instrument. They added a new three-manual console and pedal board and nine new ranks. They removed two E. M. Skinner ranks (Great: Clarabella, Pedal: Trombone). This brought the total number of ranks to fifty-one.

After 40 years the organ was in need of another rebuild project. In 2012 the Peragallo Company of Patterson, New Jersey was selected for the project. A new four-manual Skinner-style console was installed and the organ was completely rebuilt. The pipes of the instrument were cleaned with the reed pipes disassembled and reed tongues and shallots burnished. The switching system of the instrument is state of the art allowing for hundreds of levels of combinations and playback and record features.
