From the Archivist ...

1944 / 1945 SEASON FROM HANDWRITTEN NOTES

The information for this time period is lacking in that there is very little written in the record books. There are a few inserted loose pages in the books, which could mean that the rest of the records for this time period were lost with the passing of time.

On October 24, following a covered dish supper, the Executive Board met at Fourth Street Reformed Church. Irene Bressler, chair of the Program Committee presented tentative programs for the season. No record of programs was given in the minutes of the meeting.

Doris Stuart reported a "small" balance in the treasury. She also described the Fine Arts Building that was being planned for Harrisburg. The Organist Guild was invited to participate and perhaps furnish a room in the new building.

On November 7 the Executive Board met at the home of Helen Runkle. The Dean presented information on the problem of having the Guild participate in the Christmas program with the Wednesday Club. On a motion by Miss Runkle and a second by Mrs. Henry it was decided that the organist would withdraw from the program.

Dr. Rhein invited the Guild to his home for a musical on November 18, and he asked each member attending to bring a gift at that time.

The Secretary was authorized to purchase post cards.

That's it folks! Next season the "campaign" for an organ in the Forum begins with some interesting things happening!

Delaware Pipe Organ Encounter 2014

Have you ever eaten at a table with an organ on it? Until we ate at David Storey's organ building business as part of our Delaware Pipe Organ Encounter experiences, I never had. This unique experience was one of many in our afternoon trips at POE, such as watching a very funny short silent film accompanied by the Dickenson High School Theatre Organist, Michael Britt, exploring a small part of one of the organ chambers, seeing the wonderful collection of Tiffany glass windows in Brown Memorial Park Avenue Presbyterian Church and hearing and exploring the organ there. Along with this we also visited several churches and heard performers play in places such as St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Christ Church Christiana Hundred, First and Central Presbyterian, Grace United Methodist, Longwood Gardens, and the Episcopal Church of Saints Andrew and Matthew.

I also attended a workshop with Mr. Donald Sutherland, my teacher during the camp, on practice techniques, another with Mr. Marvin Mills on touch and articulation, and a third with Dr. David Herman on improvisation. These workshops gave me a lot more information to process and apply in my playing, and reminded me about parts of playing that I knew, but sometimes glossed over. Other people attended, at the same time as I was attending the above workshops, ones with Dr. Edward Alan Moore, Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman, and Dr. Daniel Aune. We all went to a master class with Mr. Nathan Laube where he worked with students on pieces by Bach, Dubois, and my piece by Franck.

Our practice occurred for three hours each morning at churches with a teacher and two students at nearly the same level. This compromised all my practicing for the whole week because I didn't get practice time at the organ at nights. Since the church had one organ, I practiced about half the time on the piano while the other student was working on the organ. This way it was easier to stay focused and alert for

working on the organ. This way it was easier to stay focused and alert for three straight hours.

In the evening, several events were planned such as a game of Organ Jeopardy, a getting to know you event, a pool party, and an ice cream social. This enabled us students to feel more comfortable participating in workshops and performing in front of each other, as well as helping us to develop relationships with people with similar interests that I hope will continue for the rest of my life.

POE has helped me encounter, enjoy, investigate, explore, appreciate, study, practice, and understand organs better by providing opportunities to play on many different organs, study with top-notch teachers, hear wonderful players in faculty recitals, and learn from workshops. I also have developed relationships with people who share my interest in the wonderful world of the organ.

Rachel's father Steve shared the following thoughts with the leaders of the POE in Delaware:

"Rachel came home with several pieces of music and an organ pipe, which she found particularly fun. She advanced in her skills as an organist with a very different piece than those she's played before. She made many like-minded friends who share her passion for music and diligence to study.

I very much appreciate the AGO. The organ has been the easiest instrument of all those our children have studied with much support from the Guild from members taking time to express interest in Rachel and offer encouraging words, invitations to meetings including lessons on practicing, for example, and one on leading hymns that I attended with her and found fascinating in its practical technical advice and its philosophical backdrop of the role of the professional organist in worship. She has also had recital opportunities from the AGO. And certainly, scholarships from the Lancaster and Harrisburg AGOs, including the scholarship to attend POE, have made the organ easier to add to Rachel's other instruments. Also, churches have been glad to invite (and pay) her to play their Sunday services as a substitute giving her playing experience, a sense of the breadth of the church, and a source of income. Last but certainly not least, we are grateful for several fantastic teachers: Margaret Marsch, Shelly Moorman-Stahlman, and Donald Sutherland. POE is an expanded version of the experience Rachel has had in the Guild for the last two years, when she began her studies. Thank you for all the organization and preparation work that you, the teachers, chaperones, and all the other helpers contributed to make POE a success."


