President and Artistic Director, Patrick J. Murphy, will host the day. Mr. Murphy became interested in pipe organ construction as a school high student studying the organ. Throughout this

period and during college breaks, he performed tuning and service work in and around the Philadelphia area. In 1978, he was the first recipient of the Organ Historical Society's E. Power Biggs Fellowship.

After graduation from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1983 (B.M. in Performance) and further apprenticeships with several firms in the Middle Atlantic States, he founded his

own company, Patrick J. Murphy & Associates, Incorporated Organbuilder, in 1987. Various organist appointments have contributed to a pragmatic understanding of the needs of both the musician and instrument alike. Today his work involves design and construction of new organs, restoration of existing organs, and contracted tuning and service throughout the Delaware Valley.

Patrick is a member of the Organ Historical Society, The American Institute of Organbuilders, and the American Guild of Organists. In addition to his wife and family, he is involved with steam railroads and historical items relative to the pipe organ.

At Patrick J. Murphy & Associates, the primary goal is to professionally envision and construct new pipe organs and restore existing instruments that transcend the esthetic and artistic vision of our clients in a personable, knowledgeable, and practical manner.

- Ist Session: Reading Session of St. James Music Press (We're good, we're cheap, and we're snooty)
- 2nd Session: The Liturgical Mysteries (The Feast of St. Yogi the Unbearable)

In 1974, **Mark Schweizer**, a brand-new highschool graduate decided to eschew the family architectural business and become an opera singer. Against all prevailing wisdom and despite jokes from his peers such as "What does the music major say after his first job interview?" (answer: You want fries with that?), he enrolled in the Music School at Stetson University. To his father, the rationale was obvious. No math requirement.

Everything happens for a reason, however, and he now lives and works as a musician, composer, author and publisher in Tryon, North Carolina with his lovely wife, Donis. If anyone finds out what he's up to, he'll have to go back to work at Cracker Barrel. He actually has a bunch of academic degrees, including a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Arizona. I know! What were they thinking? He puts his musical training to use as the Head Cheese at St. James Music Press, a church music publishing company — Motto: We're good, we're cheap, and we're snooty!

Mark is the author of the "Liturgical Mysteries," twelve highly acclaimed comic mysteries set in the fictitious town of St. Germaine, North Carolina and a 1940s Chicago police thriller, *Dear Priscilla*. His writing and sense of humor can also be found in the classical music section of *Faking It: How to Seem Like a Better Person Without Actually Improving Yourself* from the writers of <u>collegehumor.com</u> and published by the New American Library.

In the field of bad writing, Mark had the distinction of receiving several Dishonorable Mentions in the Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest, an annual contest in which the entrants compete for the dubious honor of having composed the worst opening sentence to an imaginary novel. These and others can be found in *It Was a Dark and Stormy Night: A Collection of the Worst Fiction Ever Written*, edited by Scott Rice and published by The Friday Project.

From the Archivist ...

Notes from 1947 / 1948

The Harrisburg Chapter held a meeting February 23 after the memorial recital for Mr. Henry VanPelt, a former member. The Treasurer reported a balance of \$333.89. The Nominating Committee reported that it was working seriously on the ballot for the next year. After much discussion it was decided to present a guest recitalist, Richard Ross, a member of the faculty at Peabody Conservatory and organist at Brown Memorial Methodist Church in Baltimore. The date for the recital was April 6.

The Annual Hymn Festival was held Sunday, October 21, at 4 o'clock at Fourth Reformed Church, Sixteenth and Market Streets. These are the last entries in the Registrar's records until September 1950 due to the fact that the Registrar's record book was lost at this point.

The following is the record of the meetings for the Executive Board:

August I, 1947

It was announced by Dean Bowman that new by-laws will have to be written. A picnic for Guild Members will be held August 16 at Steele's cottage.

August 19, 1947

Plans were laid for the Regional Convention to be held on Tuesday, September 29. The program included recitals at Zion Lutheran, Fourth Reformed, Grace Methodist, and a Guild Service at Market Square Presbyterian. There were also workshops on various topics as well as a music display J. H. Troup Music Store.

November 11, 1947

The Executive Committee met at Grace Methodist Church. It was decided that \$5 would be given to churches where Chapter meetings are held and a \$5 payment would be given for janitorial services if required at meeting sites. No further record of Executive Committee meetings until September of 1949.
