Good News is a Christmas cantata for SATB voices based on the popular 2-part anthems by Natalie Sleeth found in her Sunday Songbook collections and Laudamus. The work is being published by Hinshaw Music. Hinshaw is also releasing Joseph's Song, a Christmas anthem for SAB voices, an original work done in collaboration with Herb Frombach.

The Lorenz Corporation is releasing Masterworks for Organ, eight easy arrangements of organ classics. Among the works are Gigout's Grand Choeur Dialogue, Rhosymedre by Vaughan Williams, and a movement from one of Mendelssohn's organ sonatas. Lorenz is also re-publishing two earlier organ works -- The Lone, Wild Bird and Humbly I Adore Thee -- in Easy Organ Library, Volume 58 and The Organist's Library, Volume 58.

Outreach to Brazilian Students

As many of you know, I spent two months in Brazil this spring performing organ and piano recitals and giving master classes. I had an awesome adventure and I will share with you a few stories as a series in the upcoming newsletters.

When I was a senior in high school, my family hosted a foreign exchange student from Brazil. Cristina and I immediately became like sisters. When she returned to her home after six months, I thought that I would never see her again. However, I did not forget about her and when I was in graduate school, I gave a class project on the Cavaille-Coll organs in Brazil. After many years of no contact, she reconnected to our family through facebook three years ago. In January 2014, my husband and daughters travelled to Brazil to meet her family (she has 3 children which are about the same age as mine). Since that trip was a vacation, I was not planning to see any churches or organs. However, one day we were driving around Jundiai (her city) and I saw a beautiful cathedral and asked to see inside. To my amazement, I was greeted with not just an organ but a Cavaille-Coll organ! The Priest who was thrilled to have someone there who cared about the instrument and its rich history, told me about 2 other Cavaille-Coll organs in neighboring towns and we visited all of them that day. Each of the Cavaille-Coll organs were beautiful but did not function. I had the opportunity to visit with the priests of the churches and they lamented about the conditions in Brazil that made it impossible to restore the organs and the lack of organists to play the organs in the country. At that moment, I felt a calling to return in the future to help .

This month, I would like to tell you about an exciting cultural exchange that has been planned for January 2016. While performing in Brazil, I taught several master classes for students preparing for church music ministry and music education at the Baptist Seminary Theological Seminary in Rio. These students were AWESOME. Their love for music permeated everything they did. When I left that place, I could not forget the students and wanted to create an experience for them and for other music students in Brazil that would enable them to experience church music at

the finest. Upon returning, I created a 3-week course that I would teach at LVC for them. The course will occur January 14 -Feb. 4, 2016 (yes, it is cold then but that is their summer vacation so they will be able to come at that time). On Monday and Wednesday each week, they will experience music theory classes, sing in the choirs, have organ and piano lessons with me, and have plenty of time to practice. They will also have seminars on these days on handbells (this is a rarity in Brazil which fascinates them), Orff instruments, and methods to improve congregational singing. On Tuesday and Thursday each week, we will explore area churches. I have a day planned for Annville to represent smaller churches, Hershey, Harrisburg and Lancaster to represent midsize cities, and Lititz with Moravian tradition. At each church, we will explore the hymnody and basic format of the services and compare that to the traditions in their country. On the weekends, we will explore larger cities. We will attend Evensong in NYC at St. John the Divine and at St. Thomas, we will visit the Wanamaker and Kimmel Center in Philadelphia, and we will explore a few churches in Baltimore. I also have a few fun activities planned such as a free day in NYC, pretzel factory in Lititz, seeing a few Amish farms in Lancaster, Hershey chocolate, and plenty of parties. I will be teaching the course for them in Portuguese (yes, I'll tell you about my experiences learning the language in upcoming issues). However, most of them know basic English so they will be able to interact with the LVC students and the musicians that they meet as we explore all the churches.

How can you help? When I originally had this idea, I thought that I would limit the number to about 6 students that would enlist. However, after making the announcement two days ago, I have already had 20 people indicate that they would like to come and they are all <u>so</u> excited. (For many of them, this will be a dream come true.) My ability to be able to host more will be based on what type of additional resources I will be able to find. My commitment to the students is that they will only need to pay for their airfare and visas (which is a substantial cost for them and many of them will have to find donors in Brazil to help them). I will find housing, food, and transportation for them while they are here. Here are ways that you can help.

- Consider sponsoring a lunch during one of the days we are touring area churches (we will pack our lunches every day but it would be nice for the chapter or a few members to sponsor a meal when we are in Harrisburg and in Hershey...Perhaps have Kentucky fried chicken or Subway sandwiches brought to the church where we are visiting.)
- 2. Sponsor a hotel room for the night that we will stay in NYC.
- 3. Volunteer your van and drive for a day.
- 4. Plan to meet us in the churches and welcome the students and interact with them.
- 5. Donate free organ music suitable for an intermediate organist (please choose only the best quality music for them. Hymn arrangements are great but choose the best composers such as Burkhardt, Hopson, Lau, etc). Things

such as the Ritchie/Stauffer Method Book, Davis Organ Method Book or the Wayne Leupold would be perfect because they do not have good method books available there. Also there will be several students who play the piano for their church. They love music of Mark Hayes, John Leavitt, etc and that music is expensive there.

I see this course as the first step to creating more opportunities for cultural exchange programs in the future. I hope to take a few LVC organ students to Brazil in May 2016 and we will team up with students at the Baptist Seminary school to teach area high school students the basic of playing the organ. Then in January 2017, I hope to repeat the course on church music in USA. In May 2017, I hope to offer a study abroad program in Brazil designed for LVC music education students in which our students will observe music education in schools in Brazil.

I also hope to coordinate efforts to restore three Cavaille-Coll organs in Campinas, Juniai, and ltu, coordinate efforts to find a new pipe organ for the Rio Baptista Seminario, create intercultural partnerships between church musicians in USA and Brazil, establish internships for Brazilian builders to study in United States, facilitate publication of Brazilian organ music, and of course perform numerous more piano and organ recitals in Brazil in the future (more about all of these in an upcoming issue).

Camp Hill Presbyterian Church Organ Addition

96 pipes (Mixture III) were added to the pedal division of the Schantz Organ at Camp Hill Presbyterian Church on May 11 & 12. This brings the total number of ranks to 42. This addition was made possible by a young woman who grew up in the church. The gift was in memory of her parents.

Dean Gingrich convened the meeting at 7:05. Agendas, Procedures and Throne Scholarship guidelines were given to all committee members.

Dean:

- Called for approval of the agenda; moved by Ray Edmison and seconded by Josephine Freund. Agenda was approved.
- Noted that the minutes of the February meeting were reviewed and adopted previously.
- Reviewed two actions that were ratified by email. Asked for formal approval of both actions; moved by Judy Schrack and seconded by Carolyn Wright. The actions were approved. Both points of ratification are included in detail and made part of the agenda.

New Business:

- A point was raised by Zack Sten about protocol when an at-large member is elected to an officer position. Must that person resign followed by an election to fill the position? Shawn will check with the Regional Councillor for clarification. (Since the meeting, the Regional Councillor said that there does not have to be a resignation, just a shift of position and appointment to fill the vacancy created.)
- <u>Throne Scholarship Guidelines –</u> We reviewed the Guidelines handed out by Shawn. He noted these guidelines were taken directly from the guidelines used for other scholarships. As instructed by the Board at the February meeting, Shawn Gingrich, Ralph Kneeream and Carol Hunter compiled and reviewed the document approving its contents for review by the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee reviewed them and found the following:
 - (a) The assistance paragraph should be limited to providing *registration* assistance.
 - (b) Change the language "applicants are encouraged to attend..." to must attend events sponsored by the AGO. Remove "Other events will be considered but may not be approved".
- Applications will be given to the Education Committee for approval.

The Dean will post the guidelines with these revisions on the web site.

- <u>Chapter Procedures –</u> Shawn explained the process of biennial elections proposed by National and the process required to move to a biennial election. This was favorably accepted by the Committee.
- Karen and Shawn explained the remaining changes, corrections and additions to the Procedures previously adopted in November, 2014. Since the remainder of the changes to the Procedures were cosmetic in nature with minor grammatical or typographical errors, it was moved by Bob Bell and seconded by Zack Sten to accept the amendments and changes.
- When finalized, the Procedures will to emailed to all chapter members and mailed to those members without email. Chapter members will be instructed to review the Procedures prior to the annual Board meeting May 12th. Questions and concerns may be addressed at that time.

Reminder that the next meeting is May 12, 2015, at Colonial Country Club. Board members are expected to attend.
