

Notice was sent out via email recently of a wonderful bequest received from the estate of Frances Bishop. The initial distribution which was received in June totals \$126,000. There is additional money remaining being held in reserve for contingencies of which we will receive 20% at the end of the year when the estate is completely settled. The will stipulates that the money is to be held in a separate account and the proceeds are to be used "for purposes of public recitals." This gift will provide our Harrisburg Chapter with perpetual funding for organ recitals and we are grateful for Frances Bishop's generosity and this benefit of her legacy for us and our community to

The only POE+ offered in the United States this summer was sponsored by the Harrisburg Chapter, from July 10-14, based at Messiah College, Grantham, PA. Adults, age 19 and over, eager to learn more about organ playing, were eligible to enroll. Twenty-two adults, from Pennsylvania and ten other states, studied for the week with eleven professional organists, some from our chapter and others with ties of previous employment, residence or education in the Harrisburg "Thank you for making a wonderful opportunity area. Remembering Frances Bishop—reprinted from November 2003

Getting to Know You—Interviews with Our Members by Ruth Brommer

Her blue eyes twinkling, her dimples deepening, feminine to the last thread of her light, summery dress, Frances was a delight to meet at our "Monthly Lunch Bunch" gathering at the Radisson in August. As we sat in the lobby talking about her activities, it occurred to me that her most enchanting quality was her ability to convey the impression that she knew many little enticing secrets that she was going to share between us girls, but just as she had me on the edge of my chair waiting, we were on to something new and different!

One thing she did share that is very unusual is that she still lives in the same house in which she was born. Most people don't even live in the same state where they were born. Frances is currently the organist for Zion Lutheran Church on Fourth street in Harris-

burg. She began her musical studies with the piano at about age 8, encouraged by her mother, who had taken piano lessons herself. She studied piano for almost 10 years. While in junior and senior high school, she studied clarinet with Salvadore Colangelo, chief clarinetist of the Harrisburg Symphony at that time. She continued playing clarinet during college, but eventually put it aside, an action which she now regrets.

Her post-high school education continued at Elizabethtown College, where she was an accounting major and took her BS degree in Business.

She went on to take Temple University courses at the Harrisburg Campus and received her MBA while working at a full-time job as well as being an organist. She refers to her MLA as her "unfinished" project - the course work is finished; she just needs to get her advisor to approve the last paper she has written. Currently she takes continuing education courses at Elizabethtown College and horticulture classes at HACC. She also takes courses in conjunction with the Senior Historians, a group which has the Masonic Home as it's base.

All the while that she was working on her Business Degrees, she was taking both choral and orchestral electives. For many, many years after college, she studied with Bob Clippinger. Her first paying job was at Highspire United Methodist for two years. She moved on to Holy Trinity Lutheran in Hershey where she served as organist for 23 years. She spent 2 years as an interim organist/choir director at her home church in Oberlin before moving on to Derry Street United Methodist. There she was organist/choir director for over 10 years. From there she moved to Trinity Lutheran Church in Harrisburg on to Paxton United Methodist and then to her present job at Zion.

Besides her part-time organist positions, she began working her way up in the business world, starting with an insurance agency, then to the PA Division of the American Cancer Society and from there to her last and longest tenure - 40 years - with the state government of Pennsylvania. She first worked for the Joint State Government Commission, a research branch for the General Assembly, where she did fiscal and legal research.

She later became an administrative assistant for Senator William J. Lane, who represented Washington and Greene Counties. When he chose not to run for reelection, she moved to the Pennsylvania Personal Income Tax Bureau, the first person hired as staff from outside the PA Department of Revenue when the personal income tax was enacted early in 1971. She became the Chief of the Information Division, and it was her responsibility to inform and educate employers and taxpayers of the provisions of the Personal Income Tax Act. She also answered questions about the Property Tax Rent Rebate Program, handled sensitive correspondence and was a ghost writer. She retired from the Commonwealth in 1997.

Not content to just sit back and take it easy, she is an active gardener, attends the Symphony and Hershey Theatre, and is a member of the Wednesday Club, the Winterthur and Smithsonian Associations, and another one she bets no other organist belongs to, the PA Farm Bureau! She also is treasurer of the Churchville Cemetery Association in Ober-

lin. In addition she continues to collect books and some Hummels from time to time.

Frances has one brother who lives in Cleveland, 2 nieces and a grand niece. She regrets that she did not keep a daily journal or diary of her life experiences, but when she really does retire from most of these other activities, she would like to write a book about her experiences both in her business vocation and her music avocation. Fortunately she has kept accurate records of what she plays and would like to advise new musicians to do likewise.

Frances has been a member of our chapter since the sixties and served as the secretary, a board member, chair of the Cassel Scholarship Committee, typist on the Bombarde staff, and was chair of the program Committee for the Regional Convention that was held during the seventies. She is very thankful that there are now many persons available and willing to perform all the responsibilities and duties that are necessary to keep the Chapter alive and healthy.
