Houston 2016 Convention by Aaron Sunstein

I am so grateful to the Harrisburg chapter for sponsoring both my workshop presentation at the recent Houston AGO national convention as well as providing additional support through Shawn Gingrich's appointment of me to represent the chapter in his absence. The convention in Houston was a wonderful experience full of excellent music, worship and fellowship. I was also very pleased that my workshop was very well received and attended, with 40+ in attendance including Michael Barone.

The opening convocation was held in the enormous space of St. Martin's Episcopal Church, which I believe is the largest congregation of that denomination in the country. The room has generous acoustics, and the Schoenstein organ can be quite effective depending on who is playing it. I personally found the Texas neo-gothic architectural style uninspiring but I am sure that others enjoyed it. Typically for AGO conventions, the hymn singing with so many organists was the most inspiring element of this service.

On Monday, I attended Ludgar Lohmann's concert on the fine Fritts organ at St. Philip

Presbyterian. This instrument is an excellent example of all that is well in American organ building today. L o h m a n n 's p r o g r a m included Bach's G minor Fantasy and Fugue as well as Liszt's BACH. For me

the highlight was Buxtehude's massive chorale fantasy on "Nun freut euch, lieben Christen g'mein" which allowed the performer to show many of the instrument's contrasting stops. The evening program was played by French organist Michel Bouvard, a teacher currently much in demand by American organ students looking to study in Europe. His demanding program included Alain's *Trois Danses*, Duruflé *Prelude and Fugue on ALAIN*, and a new composition by Joan Tower. Unfortunately I was seated in the crossing of the very large Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart and the Pasi organ did not make the trip up the nave and around the bend very successfully so it was difficult to hear the music in any detail.

Special highlights on Tuesday were Richard Elliot's concert with brass at First Presbyterian church and David Cherwien's hymn festival at St. Luke's

UMC. Elliot handled the Aeolian-Skinner organ at First Presbyterian with great skill. His rendition of Reger's chorale fantasy on "Wie schön leuchtet" was a highlight of the convention. David Cherwien as usual lead hymns with great energy, panache, and creativity.

Wednesday's highlight and indeed for me the high point of the entire convention was the evening concert of the St. Thomas Choir of Men and Boys at the Co-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart. Having learned from my experience at Monday



evening, I arrived early and secured seats in the front of the church close to the choir. It had been some years since I had heard this group. The playing a n d conducting was shared by the young organ scholars Stephen Buzard a n d Benjamin Sheen due

to the sudden death of Organist and Choirmaster John Scott last fall. A program note indicated that Scott had planned the entirety of the program with the exception of the addition of a piece he had written included in his memory by Sheen and Buzard. Even after Scott's death, the standard of the choir remains outstandingly high. They performed a challenging program including music spanning the range of Anglican choral music from Tallis to Hancock as well as Bach's "Komm Jesu Komm." I was especially impressed by the power and clarity of the boy sopranos and enthused by the sheer delight that they took in their music making. Even when the choir moved to the back of the church a bit past the program's midpoint to sing accompanied anthems including Ireland's Greater Love and Parry's I was Glad their sound was penetrating and focused, even from my seat at the opposite end of the church. The quality and passion of this choir and the excellent program performed give me great hope for the future of church music.

On Thursday, I attended a concert of baroque chamber music performed on period instruments by Ars Lyrica Houston, a group led by University of Houston professor and former NYACOP winner Matthew Dirst. I enjoyed hearing rarely heard concerti by W.F. and C.P.E. Bach in the beautiful space of the opera house at University of Houston. The closing program was ambitious in scope and cleverly designed. Returning to St. Martin's Episcopal Church, talent improvisers John Schwandt and Aaron David Miller shared a program which included their improvisations based on themes by Hildegard von Bingen. The whole program was united by a space theme—since Houston is the home of NASA. A greeting from astronaut Jeff Williams, who is stationed at the International Space Station opened the program. Images of planets and stars were broadcast on a screen behind the

performers. That morning I had presented a workshop about using exactly this type of presentation to enliven organ concerts so I was thrilled to see this at the closing concert. While Hildegard's themes were melismatic and difficult to recall, Schwandt and Miller were able to use short snippets to keep the theme in the listener's ear. The program also included concerti by Poulenc (played by Schwandt) and Howard Hanson (played by Miller) accompanied by the Houston Symphony. These 20th century pieces worked well with the space theme of the program. The most fun aspect of the evening was Miller's arrangement for organ four-hands of music from the movie Interstellar by Hans Zimmer. The soundtrack originally included pipe organ so this arrangement was especially appropriate and great fun! The final convocation was a great ending to a great week!

St. Matthew Lutheran Church to Present Organist, Richard Elliot for Organ Rededication

The St. Matthew Lutheran Church Concert Series will present organist, Richard Elliott, the Organist at the Mormon Tabernacle, in concert when the church rededicates their world renowned instrument on Sunday, October 23 at 3:00 PM. The church is located at 30 W. Chestnut Street, Hanover, PA. Free tickets are required for admission and can be ordered by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to the attention of Scott Fredericks at the church. A free-will offering will be taken to assist with the concert series costs. Tickets may be ordered from September 10- October 10. Tickets will be mailed on October 12th. Please note the number of tickets desired. The doors open at 2:30 PM. A reception will follow the program. Photos of the renovation process will be on display. The next concert in the Series will feature Peter Richard Conte on Sunday, November 20 at 4:00 PM. Conte is the organist at Macy's (originally Wanamaker's) in Philadelphia which houses the largest working pipe organ in the world. Conte is also the organist at Longwood Gardens. Free tickets will be available for this concert in late October. Additional information can be found on the church website stmattlutheran.org.

The St. Matthew Austin pipe organ is one of the ten largest pipe organs in the world. The instrument has recently undergone a major five year renovation which was paid for by gifts from church members, local organizations and foundations and interested music lovers. The original organ, designed by J. Herbert Springer, contained 5,000 pipes and was placed in the church in 1925. The instrument was enlarged several times under the leadership of Springer with funding coming from benefactor, Clara Glatfelter Moul. The new 2014 console operates over 230 stops and 14,000 pipes plus the new digital and MIDI stops and the Maas-Rowe 198-bell carillon is playable from the console. During the renovation all old wiring was replaced, thousands of pipes were cleaned and reconstructed and the organ was made solid state. The balcony (antiphonal) division of pipes was significantly enhanced with the addition of several ranks of new pipework, the revoicing of existing pipes and the addition of new digital voices. The organ has been played by many of the world's finest organists and is notable in the history of organ building. Several recordings have been made on the organ and the instrument can be heard regularly in worship, as well as in concerts, tours for children, Christmas Concerts, bus tours and programs for retirement homes.

Richard Elliott is Principal Organist at the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, where he participates in the daily recital series on the 206-rank Æolian-Skinner organ and accompanies the Mormon Tabernacle Choir on the choir's weekly radio and TV broadcast, "Music and the Spoken Word." As accompanist for the Tabernacle Choir he has performed in many of the world's great halls and appeared on numerous television and radio programs, including the NBC "Today Show," the "CBS Morning

Show," "CBS Sunday Morning," and "A Prairie Home Companion."

Dr. Elliott appears on dozens of recordings and videos with the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. In his work with the choir he has collaborated with many guest artists including Andrea Bocelli, the Canadian Brass, Renée Fleming, Evelyn Glennie, the King's Singers, Brian Stokes Mitchell, Charles Osgood, Robert Shaw, James Taylor, and Bryn Terfel.

In 1994 he recorded his first solo compact disc, titled "In the Shadows of the Everlasting Hills," on the Pro Organo label. His second solo CD on the Mormon Tabernacle organ, "Every Time I Feel the Spirit," was released in the summer of 2009 on the Klavier label. He has also recorded three compact discs in collaboration with his colleagues on the Tabernacle organ staff. Dr. Elliott is a published composer and arranger of music for organ and for choir.

Prior to his appointment as a Tabernacle organist in 1991, Dr. Elliott was an assistant professor of organ at Brigham Young University. He has performed extensively as a recitalist in the United States and in Europe, and for several years was assistant organist at the John Wanamaker Department Store (now Macy's) in Philadelphia, home to the world's largest functioning pipe organ. A Fellow of the American Guild of Organists, Dr. Elliott has been a featured performer at national

and regional conventions of the guild.

native of Baltimore, Maryland, Dr. Elliott received his early musical training Peabody the at Conservatory and the Catholic University of America. He was awarded **BMus** а the degree from Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, and MM and DMA degrees from the Eastman School of



Music in Rochester, New York. His organ teachers have included David Craighead, Dale Krider, William Watkins, and John Weaver.

Fine Arts at First Opens Season

The Mendelssohn Piano Trio will open the 2016-2017 Fine Arts at First concert series at First Lutheran Church, 21 S. Bedford St., Carlisle on Sunday, Septem-



ber 18 at 3 P.M. featuring works by Schubert, Turina, Bloch, and Chopin.

Serving as Ensemble-in-Residence at Messiah College as well as the Embassy Concert Series in Washington, D.C., the Mendelssohn Piano Trio has performed over 500 concerts in the US, Europe, and Asia and has recorded 15 CDs, including a cycle of the complete Haydn Piano Trios.

Superb soloists in their own right, the musicians have performed solo engagements throughout the US and abroad. Violinist Peter Sirotin, a native of Ukraine, is concertmaster of the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra and artistic director of Market Square Concerts. Fiona Thompson, from England, is principal cellist of the Harrisburg Symphony. Pianist Ya-Ting Chang is from Taiwan and serves as executive director of Market Square Concerts.

The concert will mark the ensemble's third appearance at First Lutheran Church. Admission is free to all. A freewill offering will be received, and a reception will follow the performance where the trio's recordings may be purchased.
