Brett Terry

Requiem æternam dona eis Domine et lux perpetua luceat eis

On February 27, 2019, Brett Terry, Dean of the Harrisburg Chapter, AGO, died suddenly. He was 31 years old. Since 2015, Brett had served as Minister of Music and Worship at the Pine Street Presbyterian Church in Harrisburg, having previously held a similar position at the Scarsdale Congregational Church in Scarsdale NY. Music, song, and Christian worship were the lifeblood of this consummately talented young man. From his childhood, Brett pursued a life of musical performance in both sacred and secular repertoire, achieving milestones of excellence that not only distinguished him, but endeared him to people of every age and station. His life was a paramount example of selfless dedication to his calling, and passionate devotion to the Christian faith. In service as in music, he was a colleague in ministry, a presence made manifest in every corner of the Church and in all times and places, he lived out his foundational belief in a God of unconditional and all-embracing love. Brett was born in Bartlesville, Oklahoma on June 6, 1987. He received his early music education in piano, organ and voice at the First Methodist Church in Bartlesville OK, then at Grace Episcopal in Kansas City, MO and Southminster Presbyterian in Prarieville, KS. He graduated summa cum laude with his Bachelor of Music in both Vocal Performance and Organ Performance from the Conservatory of Music of the University of Missouri in Kansas City. At Yale University, he received the Master of Music in Organ Performance in 2013, studying with many of America's most accomplished organ scholars and keyboard performing artists, including Thomas Murray, Martin Jean, Simon Preston, Ken Cowan and Gerre Hancock, as only a partial list. His voice teachers included Marilyn Horne and Renee Fleming. Brett also studied with Thomas Troeger at the Yale Divinity School and Institute of Sacred Music, earning the Certificate of Church Studies,

and directing a marvelous array of worship programs and musical experiences for the Yale community. Brett was very active and widely recognized in music and the arts throughout the Northeast US, especially in the greater New York City area. He directed a 24-voice professional choir, and several concert series, as well as pursuing collaborative work with opera, ballet and musical theater. He was a highly accomplished concert organist, inspiring audiences with signature performances from the finest repertoire of music for organ, piano, and harpsichord. He was active in many professional organizations, including leadership positions in the American Guild of Organists and the American Choral Directors Association. Locally, he directed the Central Pennsylvania Oratorio Society, and organized consecutive annual programs of outstanding classical performances for the Music at Pine Street (MAPS) series. Brett always gave far more than he received. He was private and introspective, but with a loving and abundant spirit that had no limits of generosity. Among his greatest joys was the sharing of his time and surpassing talent with students, colleagues, audiences, and a countless host of others who were blessed to know him.

national chaplain to the American Guild of Organists, and is author of fifteen books and numerous essays and articles. He co-authored A Song to Sing, A Life to Live, with his daughter, Emily, one half of the singing duo, Indigo Girls. He a founder member of the Academy for Spiritual Formation. Don is a lover of Bach, chamber music, hiking and jazz.

Columbia Organ Works was hired by a church in Lewistown to remove walnuts from inside the Swell keyboard, and a large tin of nuts was removed from the instrument's innards! All hoped the operation would end the "rodent visitors" to the organ; but on the Last Sunday after Pentecost five draw knobs were frozen. This problem was corrected; but on the First Sunday of Advent investigators had to use high-tech equipment including flashlight, screw drivers, vacuum cleaner, automobile heater hose, duct taped and a wooden dowel to remove at least four dozen English walnuts from the organ. The organ has been functioning correctly ever since!

Monte Maxwell, Chapel Organist, Director of Chapel Music and the Midshipmen Symphony Orchestra, began his service at



the United States Naval Academy in 1997. Mr. Maxwell, a native of San Angelo, Texas, earned his Bachelor of Music Degree from Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, studying with Emmet G. Smith. He was then

invited to study at the Curtis Institute of Music with John Weaver where he received an Artist Diploma, Curtis' highest degree. Mr. Maxwell earned his Master of Music Degree from the Juilliard School of Music in New York City, also studying with John Weaver. While studying in Philadelphia, Mr. Maxwell was an Associate Organist at the John Wanamaker Store, playing the famed six-manual organ, the largest playing organ in the world.

At the Naval Academy, Mr. Maxwell serves as the principal organist for the Protestant and Catholic services as well as playing for weddings, memorial services, funerals and performances throughout the year. He commands the five-manual, 268-rank organ in the main chapel, which has recently undergone substantial enhancement under his direction and design. His additional responsibilities include working with the Protestant and Catholic Chapel Choirs, the Protestant Chapel Chorale, the Men's

and Women's Glee Clubs, and conducting the annual winter musical theater productions as well as the Naval Academy Midshipmen Symphony Orchestra. He oversees the annual Chapel Organ Concert series which features guest performing artists from across the United States. He has also served as the Chairman of the Naval Academy Music Department and Director of Instrumental Activities.

Mr. Maxwell's annual All Saints' Day Organ Concert has become a staple of the Naval Academy and greater Annapolis cultural community. The standing-room-only event drew some 3,000 people into the Naval Academy Chapel in 1998, breaking all records in attendance for any event throughout the Chapel's history. Due to the popularity of this event, the Academy now offers two ticketed performances of this concert each year. He has performed in the United States, South America, Eastern and Western Europe, and Canada, and is an active member of the American Guild of Organists.
