Getting to Know Your Chapter Officers

The following is the fourth installment in a series introducing our chapter officers.

Waneta Benson, Board Member

I began my career in church music when I was elected Sunday Evening Pianist at the Union Center Church of the Brethren. That church is a large country church surrounded by Northern Indiana corn fields and a cemetery. When I was twelve or thirteen years old I was elected the regular Sunday Morning Pianist. A Chorister was also elected to chose the hymns to be used at the worship services. There was no time to rehearse the hymns because the chorister usually chose the hymns to sing after arriving at church. Being the pianist was cause for much prayer for me—I fervently prayed that the hymn that had six sharps would not be chosen.

I began college at Manchester College in 1958 and studied organ with Dr. Gary Deavel. That same year, my home church purchased an electronic organ, and I became their first organist—a volunteer, elected position. College was interrupted in 1960 when I gave a year of my life to Brethren Volunteer Service. My project assignment was to begin an inner-city community outreach program with First Church of the Brethren on Allison Hill in Harrisburg. The program that I began continues as a growing

Do you know what the role of your treasurer is? Is it more than just paying the bills? Well I can tell you firsthand that the answer is "Yes". I learned very quickly that the responsibilities of the Treasurer include other duties such as collecting yearly dues and keeping records of the membership, corresponding with National Headquarters, creating ledgers of financial transactions, and providing a statement each month to the membership and to the Chapter Board.

I was very fortunate to receive excellent records from our previous Treasurer, Brian Rice. Brian served as the Harrisburg Chapter Treasurer for 8 years. Therefore, the transition for me was easy. Each month I prepare a statement in the newsletter of the receipts and disbursements for the month and the balance on account. We have a checking account and separate investments labeled the Cassel Scholarship Fund.

Part of the Treasurer's duties includes collecting membership dues. We currently have 115 members in our chapter. A portion of the

The resignation of the church organist at First Church in 1973 and the difficulty in finding a new one led the church to ask me to be interim organist. I accepted, and the interim position became a permanent position. I then resumed organ studies at Messiah College with Dr. Ron Sider. From 1988 until 1996 I held dual positions at Zion Lutheran in Marysville at an 8:30 service and at First Church at a later service. I have been Organist and Children's Choir Director at Grace Lutheran Church in Camp Hill since 1996 and am enjoying the challenge of a larger organ, a larger congregation, and a larger music budget and program.

It was in the late 1970's that I read an article in the newspaper about an AGO program and decided to attend. Since then I have been a member and have served as Sub-Dean, Registrar, Auditor, Treasurer, and Board Member.

Time for hobbies is in short supply, but I do enjoy my 7 grandchildren, and I enjoy gardening, quilting, and crocheting. My life would never be complete without music and I appreciate the programs and opportunities the AGO has provided.

Music Minister's Voice Not Silenced by Cancer

The following tribute to Harrisburg AGO Member Tom Schwalm is excerpted from the December 2000 edition of "The Lutheran."

Members of Zion Lutheran Church, Hummelstown, take being the body of Christ seriously. When their music minister's health became increasingly serious, the "body" responded. Tom Schwalm, who has throat/esophagus cancer, had a tracheotomy this year that left him virtually voiceless. Not long after surgery, Schwalm was composing music—on a

keyboard the youth minister sneaked into the hospital. But what began as a hospital secret became a ministry to medical staff when hymns and jazz tunes floated from Schwalm's room. Elaine Dent, pastor, translates his whispered directions to the choir and musicians.

"Tom's ministry of music in spite of his illness has been a powerful example of how God can take awful circumstances and turn them into beauty," Dent says.

Ann has a BS in Music Education from Ithaca College, NY. She earned her MST from the University of Wisconsin. In 1988, she was commissioned by Penn Central Conference of the United Church of Christ as minister of music and worship. Ann has written a monthly

article for conference churches in the "Cantor" on Church Music and worship for 12 years. She served as the conference educator for *The New Century Hymnal*. She has been a member of the conference worship ministries team for over 15 years and is now serving on the Steering Committee of the UCC National Musicians Network.

Ann was ordained in 1992 and has served as Interim Pastor at UCC churches in Boalsburg, York, Danville, and spent three years as Associate Pastor of New Covenant UCC in Williamsport. She is presently the Pastor of Faith United Church of Christ in State College.
