

#### **Have You Seen This?**

Last month we reviewed a collection by Janet Linker. This month we will review her Variations on "ALL HAIL THE POWER," Con-



cordia Publishing House, 97-6856.

This set of 10 variations is based on the tune CORONATION. Variation 1 is a Fanfare 11/2 minutes in length, and uses full Swell with reeds, full Great and full Pedal. Variation 2 is an Adagio using an 8' Oboe with 8' soft accompaniment and 16' & 8' Pedal to balance. This two-minute variation is in a flowing 4/4 rhythm with running triplets, not unlike Bach's Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring. Variation 3 is a Gigue lasting 45 seconds using Principals 8' - 4' - 2' & Mixture (No Pedal). Meditation is Variation 4, lasting  $1^{3}/_{4}$ minutes and uses a solo stop against soft accompaniment with light 16' & 8' Pedal. Variation 5 is a three-minute Scherzo using Flutes 8' & 2' against Flutes 8' & 4' and a light Pedal of 16' & 8'. A 1½ minute Toccata is Variation 6 with Great full to the mixture and full Pedal, including Reeds. Variation 7 is a lovely Air (quoting the J. S. Bach *Arioso*) and is  $2^{3}/_{4}$  minutes in length. This uses an 8' Reed solo, Flutes 8' – 4' accompaniment, and light Pedal. A vigorous Trumpet Tune is Variation 8 lasting 1minute and 20 seconds. Variation 9 is a lovely Cantilena setting, lasting 21/4 minutes and uses Celestes and a Solo 8' stop of your choosing. Variation 10 is entitled Finale and is a robust 2½ minute ending to the wonderful settings of this fine Hymn Tune. Many of these variations would work well as voluntaries in a Church service or in a Recital.

# **Baltimore to Host Region III Pipe Organ Encounter**

The Baltimore Chapter of the American Guild of Organists will host the 2005 Pipe Organ Encounter. The event is scheduled for July 3-8, 2005 and will be centered at Goucher College just north of Baltimore City in Towson, MD. The POE is designed to introduce young persons to the world of the pipe organ through teaching, listening, and example. Each student will receive individualized training at an organ console every day of the six-day workshop as well as class training. There will be numerous recitals and other events highlighting the history, repertoire, mechanics, and excitement of the organ. Classes are designed for experienced and beginners aged 13-18 years. Basic piano proficiency is required. Space will be limited to 50 students.

Faculty for the event is specially selected by Donald Sutherland of the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore and will feature several members of the first POE class in Philadelphia more than ten years ago, many of whom are now accomplished performers. Instruments will include a wide range of organs, large and small, mechanical and electric action, from some of the newest to some of Baltimore's most historic 19th century organs. A trip is planned to an organ shop where students will learn about the inner working of the pipe organ. There will also be plenty of opportunities for fun and camaraderie.

Goucher College's safe and secure, bucolic, 200 acre campus is located just off the Baltimore Beltway in Towson, MD and is easily accessed by car and public transportation. Double occupancy rooms in the excellent residence halls will be provided and all meals are included in the registration fee as are all class materials and transportation to sites. Students will be accompanied by chaperones at all times on and off the Goucher College campus.

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#### Frank McConnell Memorial

A posting from PipeChat by Karl Moyer

Dear friends,

A giant among us in Lancaster PA has died at age 91. Frank A. McConnell served  $52^{1}/_{2}$  years as organist-choirmaster of St. James Episcopal Church here, having been a student at St. Thomas, NYC, with T. Tertius Noble and having served parishes in Middletown, CT and Newark, NJ. The respect in which he was held by his famous teacher at St. Thomas is evident in Noble's dedication to Frank of his organ work "Legend" (Galaxy Music Corp, NYC, 1944), of which I cherish a copy.

Frank upheld high standards of Anglican music and practice at St. James, including for many years a choir of boys and men, until the realities of that within Lancaster society simply mitigated against him. He often joined forces with the late Reginald Lunt of nearby First Presbyterian Church in the performance of large choral works at either church, with their joint performances of Bach's *Passion According to St. Matthew* among them -- a rare undertaking in a small rural-area city like Lancaster. The two were honored some years ago when the Lancaster AGO chapter created the Lunt-McConnell Scholarship Fund for the support of organ students from the Lancaster area.

McConnell taught church music courses for about 40 years at Lancaster Theological Seminary and conducted the seminary choir. My first time ever to see him was in a concert by that group in a (then) Evangelical and Reformed church in Lebanon County, PA. He also edited the hymnal *Sing To the Lord* for the E&R denomination, and composed numerous choral works.

He was a Fellow of the AGO, founding dean of the Lancaster AGO chapter, and its dean 1948 - 1951 and again 1962 - 1964. He planned, led and played the music for the opening festival service of the 1967 AGO Regional Convention in Lancaster.

Frank married The Rev. Beatrice Weaver in 1958, and upon retirement the two became members of Hamilton Park U.C.C. Church, Lancaster, where his funeral was held on Saturday, January 15. Memorial gifts are invited to the Frank A. McConnell Endowment Fund for the Study of Church Music, Office of Development, Lancaster Theological Seminary, 555 West James Street, Lancaster, PA 17603.

Frank was the last of the great "old-timers" in Lancaster's church music and organ music scene within the memory of persons still living: Harry Sykes, Reginald Lunt, Harold Schaar and Marie Gast, Helen Nuss, Prof. Bankert, Dale Hershey, etc. Now they are all gone.

May he rest in peace.

- The Dean was given permission to organize a trip for students to Macungie to hear a recital by the students of Paul Jacobs.
- Tony Ciucci, Nominating Committee chair, gave a preliminary report. The slate of nominees will be published in the March newsletter.

The next meeting of the Board of Directors will be at 7:00 p.m. on May 10 at Trinity Lutheran Church in Camp Hill. The present Board as well as the newly elected Board members are requested to be present. All meetings are open to the membership.

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### **Pipes in Proximity**

by Shawn Gingrich

I wrote briefly about these two historic organs in December, 2003 when I recapped the Organ Historical Convention which was held in our area in the summer of 2003. Now I'll give more details on these two organs built by David Tannenberg which today are housed in the Single Brothers' House at the Lititz Moravian Church.


The small single-manual organ which is in the Chapel of the House was built in 1793 for the Moravian Church in Graceham, Maryland. In 1957 the Lititz congregation acquired the instrument and hired M. P. Möller to make repairs and install it. More recently James R. McFarland & Co. carried out a restoration project.

Tannenberg built this organ for his home congregation.. Originally suggested a twoinstrumanual ment but the church opted to pay less for a more modest instrument with a

organ was dedicated on August 13, 1787. The console was detached and reversed as it is today and the wind was fed from the bellows which were in the attic.
