

The Reuter pipe organ at the Derry Presbyterian Church has recently been upgraded with a multi-level combination action, which will allow each recitalist a set of their own combinations.

There is no charge to attend this recital, however there will be a free-will offering taken to benefit the Cassel Scholarship fund. The Cassel Scholarship was created from a generous gift from Violet Cassel over two decades ago and finances the first prize in our competition that is held by the Harrisburg Chapter every other year.

There will be a reception in the Fellowship Hall following the recital.

Cassel Competition Winner

Jessica Scott is a senior Organ Performance Major at West Virginia Wesleyan College. She is one of the first recipients of the Wesleyan Stars Scholarship, which is a full-tuition paid scholarship to the institution. In 2001 Jessica was the State and Regional winner of the Music Teachers' National Association Organ competition. In March 2003, she won the American Guild of Organist Young Organist competition in the Harrisburg, PA chapter. She was a national finalist in the MTNA competition in 2003.

Jessica is the accompanist for the WVWC Concert Chorale and Concentus Vocum and has toured with Chanticleer Children's Chorus of West Virginia. She serves as organist at First United Methodist Church in Clarksburg, West Virginia. Upon obtaining her degree from West Virginia Wesleyan College, Jessica intends to enter graduate study in organ performance.

Salary Survey

The American Guild of Organists has published an innovative, technology-driven salary survey for musicians serving religious institutions. The survey, which was published in the November 2003 issue of The American Organist Magazine (pp. 94-95), can be completed online at <www.agohq.org/ survey>. Alternatively, individuals are welcome to photocopy the survey published in the magazine, complete it, and return it anonymously to AGO National Headquarters. The information collected from this survey will enable the AGO to better understand the current employment trends and evaluate compensation packages of organists and choral directors throughout the country in an effort to better support these professionals. The survey, authorized by the AGO National Council and conducted by the AGO Committee on Career Development and Support, is designed to be completed within ten minutes. The actual length of completion time will depend primarily on the number of different institutions the respondent serves. Individuals employed by religious institutions are encouraged to complete the form regardless of whether or not they are Guild members. This will enable the committee to compare Guild members' compensation packages and working conditions to those of non-Guild members.

Among the many other ambitious goals of the survey are the following: document the working environments and quantify the actual salaries and benefits packages of professional organists and choir directors; update and validate the AGO's salary guidelines; assess the impact of education, Guild certification, and experience on an organist's compensation package; and assess the effects of a religious institution's economic, demographic, and denominational settings on the compensation package it provides.

Gladly Playe Wyth Stryngs

The public is invited to attend a free concert on Sunday, January 25 at 3:00PM featuring the locally-acclaimed group *Gladly Playe Wyth Stryngs* performing adapted clas-



sics, Shaker tunes, and new music on twin hammered dulcimers, violin, guitar, bass and Irish whistles.

Originally scheduled for December 14 this concert was postponed due to the inclement weather.

Gladly Playe Wyth Stryngs, together since 1998, springs from previous efforts of the duo, Fret Free, comprised of Bill Stine on hammer dulcimer and Eric Muench on acoustic double or electric bass. Bill is a music educator, choral director/composer, and long time performer on a number of instruments, including keyboards. Eric has performed in rock, jazz, and folk music groups on both east and west coasts. Craig Zumbrum plays 6 and 12 string guitars, bouzouki, (the octave mandolin), bodhran (Irish frame drum), and sings. He has helped to found a number of Central Pennsylvania Celtic bands and sings with the York Chamber Singers and York Oratorio Society. Betsy Swartz is a professional violinist with many area orchestras. She has adapted her classical style to the group's repertoire and adds dramatic descants and melodies. Erin Flynn rounds out the group, playing hammer dulcimer, whistles, and violin.

Much of the repertoire has origins in the British Isles, particularly Scotland and Ireland, and is often hundreds of years old. Most of the tunes are from within the folk idiom. The medleys might also hail from Appalachia, Russia, or the Iberian Peninsula.

Not to be confused with a standard folk revival band, *Gladly Playe* approaches each set of tunes with a plan and arrangement prepared by Bill, spiced by Eric and Craig, further ornamented by Betsy, and polished off by Erin.

Gladly Playe has performed for folk events, winery fairs, concerts, weddings, festivals, and the Pennsylvania Governor's Mansion. They thrive on audience participation. They have finished recording their second album, a Christmas offering, entitled *Glad Tidings*. Their first album, 228, (the number of strings performing on the recording) remains available.

Know Your Board Members "SPOTLIGHT on a Mystery Member" by Mary Jane Nelson

This bio comes under the general category of "...if Karl Haas occasionally does his program with mystery composers..." well, here goes!

Our mystery member was born in St. Clair, Missouri, and lived there until she went to college. She exhibited musical interest at the early age of three, when she would go to the basement alone, and play on her brother's piano for hours. Unfortunately for our mystery child, her brother did not practice sufficiently to warrant the luxury of a piano. When the family moved across town, the piano did not go with the family.

When Miss Mystery was age five, she asked Santa for a little chord organ for Christmas. Her excitement was at such a pitch that she woke everyone up on Christmas morning at 3:00 a.m. so she could open her presents. Well, the sleepy family opened their presents and all else went back to bed, except Miss Mystery, who stayed up the rest of the night, picking out Christmas tunes on her new little organ! In her words, *"That was the best Christmas that I can remember!"*

When she was in second grade, she got a very special birthday present: the family again invested in a piano so she could begin to take **real** lessons. She was so excited! You see, someone had told her parents that "*children should not* take lessons until they were in second grade!"

As a seventh grade student, she had the privilege of playing the organ for church, but alas, she hadn't had any organ lessons. She had heard that organists play with two feet and being quite inventive, she developed her own method of pedaling!

While in high school, she accompanied the high school chorus, played clarinet in the band, and sang in the choirs.

Before we delve into the college scene, a little "aside"... Our mystery member now has a young daughter of her own who has just started taking piano lessons from her mother this past year and is doing well. This daughter also enjoys animals and owns quite a variety including 13 cats, one dog, one hermit crab, two lizards, a "horse on the way," and two fainting goats! This revelation drove me to the Internet where I typed in "fainting goats" and got 20 whole pages of photos and explanation for my curiosity. In a nutshell, fainting goats are a slightly smaller version of the standard goat, who, thanks to a genetic condition called myotonia congenita, actually seem to faint when they are startled. These little critters actually served an historical purpose. Shepherds often kept the goats in with their flocks as insurance in case of predator attacks. As wolves came in for an attack, the goats would become startled and faint, while the sheep would make their getaway-not wonderful if you were one of the goats, but downright dandy if you happened to be a sheep!

Well, back to the Mystery Member. She attended Central Methodist College for two years as a piano major, but also studied organ. She transferred to the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and completed her B.M. in piano performance, as well as the M.M. in organ performance. It was during this graduate school period that she got married. She went on to complete a D.M.A. in organ performance at the University of Iowa, in Iowa City.

A full-time church job at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church in Iowa City kept her quite busy. There she directed a graded choral program with two children's choirs, a Youth Choir, an Adult Choir of 50-60 voices, two adult handbell ensembles, a brass ensemble, and was coordinator of the church's recital series—in addition to playing the organ for all of the services.

She admits that it was a very difficult decision to leave full-time church work, but she had always had a passion for teaching. When she heard that a college in the Central Pennsylvania area was looking for someone to teach organ and piano, she knew that this would be her "perfect job," as she loves both instruments. She comments, "I love teaching, and each of my students has a special place in my heart." The family moved to Pennsylvania in January of 1997. In addition to her college teaching, she also teaches private students, many of them adults, and also several youth organ and piano students. Our mystery member says she really has no time or need for hobbies outside of music, as in her own words, "music consumes me and fulfills all my needs. I also enjoy learning and can't imagine a day without the stimulation of learning something new."

Well, it's about the time to give you some really pinpointing hints as to her identity. She performs under the Phyllis Stringham Concert Management, and has performed concerts in numerous locations. She studied organ with Delbert Disselhorst, John Ditto and Delores Bruch, and piano with John McIntyre and Dennis Sweigart. Currently she coaches with Santiago Rodriguez in Washington, D.C.

At Lebanon Valley College she teaches organ, piano, class piano, handbells, Church Music Methods, Organ Literature, Organ Pedagogy, Form and Analysis, and her title is Associate Professor of Music.

And, of course, the Mystery Member is none other than Shelly Moorman-Stahlman, our Chapter's past-Dean. Her husband's name is Randy and her animalloving daughter is Megan, age 10.

Thanks to Shelly for all her involvement with the Pipe Organ Encounter held a couple years ago, and for all her encouragement and inspiration to both the Harrisburg Chapter and the Lebanon Valley College Chapter of the AGO.

Oh, yes, she also loves her family's week-long summer vacation at the ocean each year! She deserves it!

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Pipes in Proximity by Shawn Gingrich



Derry Presbyterian Church, Hershey

This month we feature the instrument that will serve us for our January event: the Reuter pipe organ of Derry Presbyterian Church in Hershey.

Derry Presbyterian Church was founded in 1724. After having three early structures the fourth was erected in 1884. An extension of the 1884 church, was erected in 1935 known as The John Elder Memorial Chapel. A Christian Education Building was dedicated in November 1951. A Sanctuary, offices, lounge, boardroom and classrooms were built in 1965. The present church, newly renovated and enlarged, was dedicated January 29, 1995.

The Reuter pipe organ, the company's Opus 1499 was installed in 1966 at a cost of \$36,769. It was dedicated to the memory of George Rentz, a former pastor who also was a Navy hero of World War I. The three-manual instrument of 27 ranks is installed in chambers at the front of the main Sanctuary. In the John Elder Chapel there is a two-manual Allen Renaissance digital organ.

In the summer of 2003 the Crossan and Savage Organ Company of Cedars, Pennsylvania replaced the existing combination system of the Reuter console with a new Peterson multi-level (99 total) solid state combination system at a cost of \$32,880. This upgrade included all new electric drawknobs, new coupler tabs, new piston buttons, toe studs, and power supply.

As I spent a bit of time with this organ I was continually drawn to the flutes. While the Swell flute is a unit speaking at four pitches it has a lovely character. The Nasonflöte in the Choir is a distinctive sound and works very well as a soft solo stop. My favorite by far is the

Great Bourdon. It has a round full-bodied tone and is just delightful.
