

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Pedals, Pipes and Pizza Event Sparks Interest in the Organ

On April 30th, a rainy Saturday morning, eleven middle and high school students traveled to Lebanon Valley College to attend a Pedal, Pipes and Pizza event. The program was organized and taught by the six students

of the organ department and their teacher and our fellow chapter member Dr. Shelly Moorman-Stahlman. The day began with Dr. Moorman-Stahlman introducing the aspir-

ing young organ students to the mighty Schantz pipe organ in Miller Chapel. As each of her students played pieces from their repertoire, Dr. Moorman-Stahlman explained the various sounds of a pipe organ and the instrument's construction.

After an hour, the students were divided by age into four groups. For the next two hours each group visited the different instruments on campus where they were able to try their hand (and feet!) at playing. Scott Cantrell and Brittany Jones showed two vid-

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Have You Seen This?

This month we review a collection of Seasonal Preludes



based on Five Hymn-tunes by Raymond H. Haan and published by AMSI catalogue #OR-14. The seasons represented are Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter and Pentecost.

The first one is *Prelude on "Freu dich sehr"* (*Comfort, Comfort Ye My People*) and is three pages in length. This piece is for manuals only and has as its registration Sw: Flute 8' and Ch (or Gr) 8', 4', 1-¹/₃'. It is full of syncopation and is very bright. I might add that each selection has the Hymn tune on another page.

The second selection is *Prelude on the Tune Gartan (Love Came Down at Christmas)*, also a lovely three-page voluntary. It begins with Sw: String Celeste 8' and Ch: (OR Gr) Soft Solo Stop 8', Pd: Soft 16' & 8'; Sw to Pd 8'. This begins gently and soft but grows into a larger registration. The last page ends quite full (FF) with reeds and increased Pedal.

Number three is *Prelude on the Tune Martyrdom* (*Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed*) and is a gentle registration throughout. Sw: Celeste 8', Ch (OR Gr) Soft 8' & 4' and Pd: 16' & 8'. Ch or Gr to Pd.

The fourth is Fanfare on Llanfair (Hail the Day That Sees Him Rise) and is a full sound on all four pages. The registration begins with Sw: Full to Reeds & Mixtures, Gr or Ch. Bright Reed 8' (and 4') and Pd: Full with Sw to Pd. If you have two trumpeters a separate page is available to copy with the brass playing the Great part.

The final one is *Prelude on Veni*, *Creator Spiritus* (*Come Holy Ghost, our Souls Inspire*). How nice to have a soft setting of this great hymn as a contrast to the many large sounding settings. It is four plus pages of Manual Celeste 8' and Melody in the Pedal at Flute 2' or 4'. Great liberty can be taken with this one. I have used it over the years at Pentecost and been very pleased with the sound it produces. This little gem of a book is currently \$8.95. It is a great one to purchase.

Notes on Our Members

Chapter Member Tom Tiehel Leaving Area

Thomas Tiehel, director of liturgical music at St. Patrick's Cathedral, Harrisburg, has been offered a wonderful opportunity to develop and lead the music ministry at Saint Peter Catholic Church, Jupiter, Florida.

The Cathedral's music ministry in Harrisburg has seen much growth throughout the past decade, involving children, youth and adults in vocal and handbell choirs, under Tom's direction.

The Cathedral's consolidated school has produced Christmas and Spring Musicals, bringing together all grades to show the combined talents of the school children. In addition, Tom taught weekly general music classes covering theory, singing, handbells, choir chimes, music history and instruments.

In Florida, Saint Peter is the fastest growing Catholic church in the Diocese of West Palm Beach, having 9,000 members at present. A new sanctuary and new school have been built recently. Seating 1,000 persons, the sanctuary is of contemporary design, and has a new 100-stop Allen digital organ.

Established in 1987, the church has three priests and six full-time staff members, all of whom have been hired since 2003. Six masses, each with a different musical style, are scheduled each week, including one in Spanish.

Tom's last Sunday in Harrisburg is June 12. He will begin his new ministry in Florida on June 18. We wish him well in his new endeavor, and thank him for his work with the Harrisburg Chapter. June / July 2005 Page 4

Westminster Concert Handbell Choir in Hershey

The Westminster Concert Bell Choir of Westminster Choir College, conducted by Kathleen Ebling-Thorne, will present a concert on Friday, June 3, 2005 at 7:30 p.m. at First United Methodist Church, 64 West Chocolate Avenue in Hershey, Pa.

Country II recording. The Choir made its Carnegie Hall debut in December 2000. In December 2002 the ensemble joined Julie Andrews, Christopher Plummer, Charlotte Church and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra for a critically acclaimed 15-city tour entitled "A Royal Christmas." The Choir has made five recordings: Westminster Concert Bell Choir, Christmas Bells, Westminster Rings!, Praise and Adoration, and Christmas at Westminster: The Westminster Concert Bell Choir.

Director of the Westminster Concert Bell Choir, Kathleen Ebling-Thorne is a graduate of Westminster Choir College of Rider University. She is a member of the sacred music department at Westminster, where she teaches classes in handbell training and conducts a second handbell choir. Ms. Ebling-Thorne is also director of sales and marketing at Malmark, Inc. - Bellcraftsmen in Plumsteadville, Pa.

Celebrating over 75 years of music excellence, Westminster Choir College of Rider University, in Princeton, N.J., is a four-year music college and graduate school with a unique choral emphasis that prepares men and women for careers as music leaders in schools, universities, churches and professional and community organizations. It has been estimated that each week, Westminster graduates conduct and teach over one million musicians worldwide.

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Pipes in Proximity

When planning began for a new music center in the early 1970s at Lebanon Valley College, now-retired Professor of Music and fellow Chapter member Pierce Getz set his sights on having a variety of organ builders represented in the new facility with one tracker organ for teaching. At the time there were four organs on campus, each built by the Möller Organ Company. One of those was retained, rebuilt and installed in the new building as a practice instrument where it remains today along with Holtkamp and Schlicker practice instruments. Dr. Getz remarked that at that time in the early 1970s the "Tracker movement" was really beginning to



take a serious place in the organ world. Dr. Getz also wanted a tracker instrument to show the students that sensitivity found in a well-built tracker action. After research and study, the college decided to purchase a two-manual Gabriel Kney tracker organ of 26 ranks which cost \$48,000.

Gabriel Kney (b. 1929) was German by birth, studied organ building in his hometown of Speyer with Paul Sattel, then four years as assistant to Franz Nagel while studying church music at the Bischöfl Institute. Kney moved to London, Ontario, in 1951 to work for another organ builder and later he founded his own company, Gabriel Kney and Co., in 1967. He built over 110 organs (*The Canadian Encyclopedia* © 2005 Historica Foundation of Canada).

The organ at Lebanon Valley College was installed in 1975 in the Organ-Choral room on the main floor of the Blair Music Center. It was used in a pre-convention recital for the Organ Historical Society in 1976. Pierce Getz presented half of that recital on the Kney and the other half on the Schantz in the Chapel.

While a student at Lebanon Valley, I studied exclusively on the Kney my first three semesters. At the time I longed to play the big Chapel organ, but as Dr. Getz noted and I now understand clearly, having that time spent with a fine tracker instrument taught me so much through the intimate control it gives.

I thank Pierce Getz for sharing his thoughts for this article.
